

Jobs Open for Twenty Michigan Nurses

Jobs for twenty Michigan nurses are available in New York City through the National Re-employment Service, it was announced this week by Major Howard Starret, State Re-employment Director. Although it is not necessary that applicants be registered in New

York state all nurses seeking jobs must be registered locally and meet the specifications laid down by the employer. The openings are in various municipal hospitals in New York City which are urgently in need of women to perform general nursing duties.

According to Major Starret the jobs will pay from \$70 to \$75 per month with the hospital furnishing room, board and laundry. Nurses referred to these jobs by the National Re-employment Service must pay their own transportation to New York. The jobs are of regular duration and applicants will work a 48 hour week. All applicants must be women under 32 years of age and must be United States citizens.

Michigan nurses who wish to apply for these jobs may register with the National Re-employment Service office serving the county in which they reside. Throughout the State 44 district and branch offices and 54 part-time offices serve every section of Michigan. The service is free.

Women Learn New Cooking Methods

There's still many a "new wonder" to be learned about the oldest of the civilized arts—cooking say women enrolled in home economics groups sponsored by the Michigan State College extension service.

For instance, a summary of the year's food work done in 14 of the 79 Michigan counties having home economics extension work revealed that the women learned new ideas about food subjects, ranging from using whole grains for breakfast cereals to new methods for preparing appetizing

roasts.

In the 14 counties 414 women indicated that they now obtained better flavored and more tender roasts by using a low constant temperature instead of following the old method of searing the meat first in a hot oven.

Good nutritional ideas were taken seriously in the various groups, as shown by the fact that 382 homemakers reported increasing the amount of iron in the meals for their families and 398 reported using more whole grain cereals in the form of breakfast foods, breads, and wafers. That essential element in the making of blood—iron—was obtained by placing in the diet egg yolks, old fashioned meat greens, and leafy vegetables.

Nutrition specialist Roberta Hersey stressed the use of Michigan-grown products as the economical choice for obtaining the necessary quantity of iron.

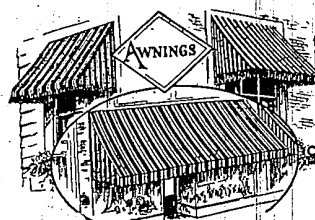
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
