Thursday, October 14, the Farmington High School defeated Milford in a very thrilling game, by a score of 25 to 0. The Farmington squad played more effectively than in any previous games, their passing and blocking being much improved.

The first touchdown was the result of a pass from Lee to Banfield, who ran about three yards for the touchdown. Turner attempted goal from placement was wide. The second touchdown was made by Turner on a ten yard run around left end. Again the kick was wide, the ball failing to go between the uprights. Pink scored the third touchdown on the longest run of the year, running fifty-five yards down the right side of the field. This time the kick for the extra point was successful. The last tally was made by Hunt, when he intercepted a Milford pass, and with the aid of excellent blocking, crossed the goal line standing up. The kick was low.

The statistics show that Farmington made 17 first downs during the game and Milford 6.
