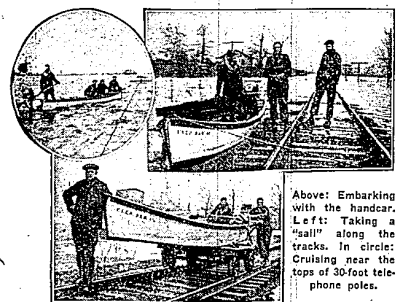


Linemen Turn Amphibian as They Patrol Wires During Ohio Flood

"Off again, on again" was the story of a railroad handcar, a boat, and some telephone linemen during the Ohio River floods early last spring. Maintaining long distance telephone lines in service near a railroad right of way in Kentucky, the linemen obtained a railroad handcar and a boat. Where the tracks were out of water, they

placed the boat on the handcar and pushed it along the rails. When they reached a point where the water submerged the tracks, they unloaded the boat and placed it in the water, loaded the handcar into it, started their outboard motor, and sailed along, carrying their rail transposers with them. When the railroad tracks reappeared above the surface, they reversed the process.

Starret to Tour Employment Offices

Major Howard Starret, Staff Employment Director, this week left for a tour of the National Employment Office in Michigan to supervise the preliminary steps in the inventory of the active file which will be taken early next month.

"We are preparing to take a complete inventory of the number of people registered in our files at every working work," Starret said. "We have been asked to do this so that we can help the Post Office Department and other govern-

mental officials in their tremendous task of taking a full census of the unemployed in this state." The National Employment Service operates 42 district and branch offices, 82 part-time or full-time service offices, and 633 farm contact points in Michigan. The N.E.S., a division of the United States Department of Labor, charges no fees to either applicants or employers.

F. H. S. Wins From Holly

The Farmington eleven was once more victorious Wednesday, October 20th, when they defeated Holly in a close game 7 to 0. It was Farmington's fourth victory against one defeat, while it was Holly's first defeat of the year, having won all of their other games by shutouts.

There was a slight shower during most of the game making the ball difficult to handle.

During the first half neither team threatened to score, but half way in the third quarter, Farmington received the first real break of the game. Holly had the ball and on their third down, they kicked but the ball was blocked and returned by a Holly man. On the next play Holly again kicked, and again the kick was blocked, this time a Farmington man downing the ball on Holly's 19 yard line. On the first play Farmington received a 15 yard penalty, putting the ball back on the 24 yard line. It was second down and 25 yards to go. Turner took the ball, faked back and threw a pass to Banfield for a fifteen yard gain. On the next play Turner again faked back and threw a pass intended for Banfield, but the ball was over his head. A Holly man jumped for the ball and managed to hit it with his hand, knocking it into the hands of Carl Hunt on the four yard line. It was first down and goal to go but Farmington lost this excellent chance to score, failing to gain on four plays.

Holly took the ball on their own five yard line and got away a very poor kick, Farmington taking it on Holly's 32 yard line. On the first play Turner faked back and threw a long pass to Banfield on the five yard line and he crossed the goal line standing up. Turner kicked for the extra point. That finished the scoring for the afternoon, although Holly threatened to score late in the last quarter, carrying the ball from their own twenty yard line up to the Farmington thirty yard line.

Farmington played without the services of their regular quarterback, Don Lohr, because of injury suffered in football practice last week.

Farmington will play Walled Lake next Friday in one of the most important games of the season, and a good turnout is expected.
