Friday, November 12, the Farmington eleven ended their 1937 football season with a victory when they defeated Brighton 7 to 0 in the last two minutes of play.

The teams were evenly matched and in the first three quarters there was no scoring although there were several threats on the part of both teams.

Brighton threatened to score in the first quarter when they carried the ball to the Farmington twenty yard line, but failed to gain from that point.

Farmington lost their best scoring opportunity because of a fumble early in the second quarter, after they had carried the ball to the Brighton thirty-yard line.

Brighton again threatened to score late in the second quarter when they carried the ball to the Farmington one yard line, but the whistle blew ending the half.

With two minutes to play in the fourth quarter, Banfield recovered a fumble at mid-field. At this point of the game, the Farmington squad showed their most effective play.

Pink and Dwyer, with the aid of good blocking and a fifteen yard penalty, smashed through the tired Brighton team for the only touch down of the day.

Dan Davis' kick sailed between the uprights for the extra point.
