TAX ADMINISTRATOR
WARNS MERCHANTS

Following several complaints from various sections of the state that persons had been misrepresenting themselves as sales tax employees, Draper Allen, managing director of the state board of tax administration, today warned merchants not to open their sales tax books or make sales tax payments to anyone who could not properly identify himself as a member of the department.

"Recent complaints have led us to believe that someone is attempting to victimize merchants by falsely representing themselves as representatives of this department," Allen said. "We have not yet heard of any merchant being swindled and are anxious to stop this practice before it occurs. Those who have complained to us say that two men came into their stores, introduced themselves as sales tax representatives and demanded to see their books. The merchants, knowing the field representatives in their districts, re-

fused to comply with their demands when the strangers were unable to produce credentials."

PRESENTED NEXT
IN LECTURE SERIES

Thrilling motion pictures of American big game will be shown at the Detroit Institute of Arts Woodward at Kirby, next Sunday afternoon, January 23, when William L. Finley, famous naturalist and photographer, appears there to speak on "Woods, Waters and Wildlife." The motion picture-lecture is scheduled for 3:30 p. m.

For thirty years Mr. and Mrs. Finley have been roaming the wide of western and southwestern United States making a picture record of wild life. They have the largest collection of animal pictures in the world, containing 200,000 feet of motion pictures and 20,000 negatives of still pictures.

Mr. Finley will show intimate pictures of bears, mountain lions, moose, eagles, hawks and other game and fowl of the west. His movies have delighted audiences at the White House. His stories and articles have appeared in several national magazines.

Mr. Finley's motion picture-lecture is sponsored by the World Adventure Series of the Detroit Institute of Arts.

McFarland Seeks to
Limit Liquor Licenses

Overcrowding of retail vendors of liquor, beer and wine calls for drastic action to correct the situation, in the opinion of the dealers, themselves, and of the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, which, through its chairman, Edward W. McFarland, is urging local governing bodies to weed out at this time those unqualified for renewal of licenses for the coming year by giving May 1.

A recent statement in the Saginaw County Retail Beer and Liquor Dealers' Bulletin under the heading, "Gross Over-Licensing Will Aid 'Drys'," Deane Anderson, Secretary, makes the following statement:

"With a deplorable gross over-licensed condition throughout the state, the 'drys' need not fear any marked state-wide opposition from the retail business."

LICENSE BUREAU
ISSUES WARNING
OF DEADLINE

If the motor vehicles now registered in Michigan are to "get under the wire" by March 1, the deadline for purchase of 1938 license plates or half-year permits, an average of \$4.00 motorist a day will have to buy their plates after Jan. 15, it is estimated by Leon D. Case, Secretary of State.

"Thousands look for an extension, despite the fact the law gives no state official authority to order one," said Case, pointing out the possibility that thousands would be unable to buy their plates by

March 1, if they wait much longer. The date for the placing on sale of half-year permits has not been determined as yet.

The 1938 plates which went on sale last Oct. 28, have been selling at the rate of less than 1,500 a day; total plates sold by mid-January are estimated at 115,600, with total registration at the highest on record—1,649,105.

"It would tax the Department to issue 34,000 sets of plates a day, but if the bulk of applications come in during the last two or three weeks, everyone can't be served," Case said, adding: "The deadline is March 1, but if too many people wait for it, it simply won't be possible to handle the business. Making an application for plates means nothing in the eyes of the law. You have to have the plates on your car."
