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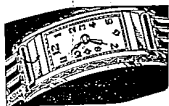

## H. B. MacDonald SPEAKS IN DETROIT INSTITUTE SERIES

The glories of the American West will be revealed in natural color motion pictures at the Detroit Institute of Arts, Woodward at Kirby, next Sunday evening, January 30, at 8:30, when Howard B. MacDonald, world famous photographer, presents his motion picture lecture, "Through the American West."

More than 5,000 feet of motion pictures, all in color, will show the rugged grandeur of the Rockies, the world's highest boulevard which is 12,000 feet above sea level, mysterious Glacier Lake, 4,000-year-old trees, the geysers and hot springs of Yellowstone, Boulder Dam, awesome Yosemite, Zion National Park, the Great Deserts, Grand Canyon.

Mr. MacDonald will accompany the pictures with an informal lecture, full of amusing anecdotes.

At 3:30 p. m. next Sunday, January 30, Mr. MacDonald will show his illuminating motion pictures on "Romantic India." Here is a film full of splendor, wealth and depths of poverty found only in this fascinating empire. Through the medium of motion pictures, Mr. MacDonald will take his audience to Calcutta, Bombay, the Himalayas, Benares, Delhi. He will show the famous Taj Mahal, the royal elephants, Hindu fakirs, jewel-encrusted palaces, burning ghats.

Mr. MacDonald's motion picture lectures are sponsored by the World Adventure Series of the Detroit Institute of Arts.

On Sunday afternoon, February 6, at 3:30, Alan Villiers, author of five "best sellers" and famed for his sailing exploits, will give a lecture, illustrated with brilliant motion pictures, on "By Way of Cape Horn." This is the story of Villiers' adventures sailing a wind-jammer in the grain races from Australia to England. This afternoon lecture is the only one Mr. Villiers will give in Detroit this season.

## S. E. Michigan Rural Teachers Hold Meeting

Delegates from fourteen counties in the southeastern section of Michigan, will meet at the Howell High School Auditorium Saturday, January 28th, at 1:30 p. m. This meeting will be under the supervision of the school commissioner of Livingston County. The counties represented at this meeting will include Genesee, Oakland, Macomb, Wayne, Monroe, Washtenaw, Livingston, Shiawassee, Ingham, Clinton, Jackson, Saginaw, Hillsdale and Lenawee.

The purpose of this meeting is to explain the aims and purposes of the Michigan Rural Teachers Association, which is the rural division of the Michigan Education Association. The speakers on this program will be Donald Baker, Commissioner of Schools of Gratiot County and President of the Michigan Rural Teachers Association; Dr. M. L. Smith, Head of the Rural Department of Central State Teachers College and program chairman of the association; and Clark Kerr, Principal of Wheeler High School, chairman of publications and former president of the association.

Not only will this meeting be devoted to addresses by the speakers but there will be an open forum for informal discussion among the teachers.

The organization began four years ago for the purpose of professionalization among the teachers of the state. During the past few months various meetings have been held throughout the state to interest rural teachers in the workings of the organization.

## MISUNDERSTANDING OF SECURITY LAW SEEN BY REDMAN

"Inquiries at our office have revealed a misunderstanding of the Social Security Act, which may be a reason why hundreds of persons who are entitled to payments have failed to claim them," W. B. Redman, manager of the Old-Age Insurance office in the Peoples State Building in Pontiac, announced today.

"Many believe their employers have filed claims for the lump-sum benefits which are due to two groups of persons at the present time, these inquiries reveal. One group is composed of those who reach the age of sixty-five after working in occupations covered by the Social Security Act. The other is composed of the heirs of persons who have died before reaching 65 and after having been employed in such fields.

"As a matter of fact employers do report to the United States Collector of Internal Revenue when contributions cease for a worker who has reached the age of 65 or who has died," Mr. Redman continued. "These reports, however, are not claims for the lump-sum benefits which are due in all such cases. The claim must be filed in behalf of the worker, through the Old-Age Insurance office," Mr. Redman stated.

## Civil Service to Hold Elevator Examinations

The United States Civil Service open competitive examination for the position of elevator conductor. The entrance salary is \$1,050 a year, less a retirement deduction of 3 1/2 per cent.

Applicants must have had, within the past 10 years, at least three months' experience in operating elevators. They must have reached their eighteenth birthday and must not have passed their fiftieth birthday.

Full information may be obtained from the Secretary of the United States Civil Service Board of Examiners at the post office or customhouse in any city which has a post office of the first or second class, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

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## Facts About the Telephone

The desk type of telephone was first used in 1856.

A new direct telephone circuit between Paris and Belgrade has been completed.

About 97 per cent of all local calls handled by Bell System operators are answered by them within ten seconds.

The 20,000th telephone in Shreveport, La., was installed the other day in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Tom B. Alton, and to little Miss Joe Ann Alton was given the honor of putting through the first call over the new telephone.

At the beginning of July of this year, the Illinois Bell Telephone Company had a total of 1,243,223 telephones in service, of which 926,323 were in the Chicago area. This is about the same number of telephones that the company had in service in April, 1932.
