HERBERT ASHTON
IS REORGANIZING
FEDERAL THEATRE
Herbert Ashton, Jr., Assistant
National Director of the Federal
Theatre Project, is now in Detroit
reorganizing the Detroit unit of
the Federal Theatre in preparation
for a strenuous season of play pro-
duction. Mr. Ashton was prompted
to leave his Chicago headquarters,
from which point he directs the
activities of Federal Theatres in
13 Mid-Western states including
Michigan by the departure from
the Detroit project of Mr. Fred
Morow, who has been in charge
of the local company since Decem-
ber of 1932.
One of the first moves announced
by Mr. Ashton was the transfer
of the Detroit Federal Theatre's
production headquarters from the
Ionic Temple, 6061 Grand River
Avenue to the Cinema Theatre,
56 East Columbia, the change
was made January 17. This should
prove to be a desirable move, for
the Federal Theatre's next pro-
duction, Eugene O'Neill's, "Anna
Christie" will open a week's run
at the Cinema Theatre, Tuesday
evening, Feb. 1.
The Detroit Federal Theatre
will also produce George B. Shaw's
"Arms and the Man" sometime in
March. Both contemplated produc-
tions will be toured through the

state, in accordance with the new
policy announced by Mr. Ashton.
Further innovations will be the
organization of a Marionette com-
pany under the direction of David
Lane, which will tour schools in the
Metropolitan area; the presen-
tation of Saturday morning shows
for children; the decision to have
the dramatic company, under the
continued direction of
Halden, present a new show at the
Cinema every month.

Solomon Island Natives
Vigorous and Fighters
The Solomons are a group of sev-
en large and a great number of
smaller islands, stretching over
about 800 miles in the Pacific ocean
east of New Guinea. Most of them
are rough and mountainous, and
covered with dense tropical forests,
writes Albert B. Lewis in Field Mu-
seum News.
The natives form a part of the
Melanesian group of peoples, all of
whom speak languages also known
as Melanesian. These are funda-
mentally related in a grammatical
sense, but differ greatly in vocabu-
lary.
The Solomon Islanders are vigor-
ous and warlike, but are compelled
to keep the peace except in the in-
terior of one or two of the larger
islands. Many of them were for-
merly head-hunters and cannibals,
and often made raids on their neigh-
bors, using large high-built war
canoes 40 to 50 feet long, capable of
carrying 25 or more men. Clubs
and spears were the principal weap-
ons, but bows and arrows were used
in some places.
The natives are of medium height,
but very considerably. In the west-
ern end of the group they are rather
tall, somewhat negroid, in appear-
ance, with kinky, black hair and a
very dark or sooty-black skin. In the
eastern islands they are somewhat
smaller, of a lighter, chocolate-
brown color, with curly or wavy
hair. It is evident that in the Solomons,
as in all other Melanesian lands,
there is an underlying Oceanic
negroid or Papuan type, mixed to a
greater or lesser degree with In-
donesian or Malayan immigrants.
For food the natives are largely
dependent on their gardens, two being
the most important foodstuffs.
Other vegetables are used to some
extent, but taro is the basis of nearly
every meal, with fish, shrimp and
other sea products being added
when obtainable. The natives are
very fond of the milk and meat of
the unripe coconut, to obtain which
they must climb the coconut palms.

troit Town Hall in the Fisher

expedition into Soviet Russia.
A brilliant speaker, Mr. Hindus is

them "The Russian Peasant and
