History of Archery

Shortly after the Civil War the United States was awakened to the sport of archery by Maurice Thompson and his brothers, who spent a lot of time in the Everglades of Florida hunting with the long bow. Later Maurice published his book "The Witchery of Archery," which created tremendous interest in archery and helped to revive it as a sport in this country.

One of the most popular archers of the present time is Howard Hill who recently was obtained by Warner Brothers, movie company, as archery instructor and doubled for the stars in the technicolor production, "The Adventures of Robin Hood." Errol Flynn and Alan Hale, members of the cast, have been so interested in archery through their contact with Mr. Hill, that they have taken on the sport for their own recreation. Mr. Hill is confident that the picture will do much to increase the interest in archery.

Many organizations and associations have been formed, together with community clubs, to promote interest in archery. Among them are United Bowmen of Philadelphia and National Archery Association of the United States.
