

Woodbrooke Wins Meet

Woodbrooke Hills Swim Club downed Orchard Valley Swim Club by a score of 240 to 222 in an exciting meet, July 15.

The Woodbrooke tankers captured 22 firsts and 25 seconds, set team records in four events and had three triple first place winners.

New team records were set by Kirk Knack in seven to eight-year-old boys one-length freestyle with a time of 18.5, Angus Macintosh in 11-12-year-old boys 50-meter butterfly with a 43.3 and by Jodi Yambor in 15-17-year-old girls 50-meter butterfly with a time of 32.6.

Triple winners for Woodbrooke included Jodi Yambor, winning the 15-17 girls freestyle and 15-17 girls butterfly individual events, and participating in the winning 64-yard combined freestyle relay along with Barb Palek, Ann Bertsch and Sandy Carruthers.

Bob Dodi won the 13-14 boys freestyle.

Farmington's Recent Grads Are Finding Full-Time Jobs

Nearly four out of every 10 students are trained to step into a job when they leave Farmington district high schools.

And 89 per cent of those who look for jobs find them.

Statistics gathered by the division of vocational education show that 84 per cent of the June 1970 graduates who trained in the co-op program, which combines on-the-job experience with classroom study, found full-time employment, either in the occupation for which they were trained or in an unrelated field.

Graduates who trained in vocational education without the co-op experience were 78 per cent successful in securing full-time jobs.

Another seven per cent of the co-op students found part-time work, and 9.9 per cent were employed part-time.

And among June 1970 graduates looking for work in the trades, only 6.5 per cent are unemployed.

In a year when 21 per cent of the 16 to 19-year-olds in the metropolitan area are jobless, the Farmington figure "is a reflection of the quality of our programs and the caliber of our students," in the opinion of Earl Baumunk, director of vocational education.

Since approximately 70 per cent of Farmington seniors continue on to college, the statistics also indicate that many local young people are using skills learned in the public

schools to help pay their college costs.

THE STATISTICS on June 1970 graduates are from a follow-up study required by the Michigan Department of Vocational Education for occupational preparatory and cooperative education courses which the state partially underwrites.

In Farmington, that includes classes in machine drafting, machine shop, retailing, advertising merchandising, Typing II, secretarial procedures, transcription and the nursing arts in the field of occupational preparation and office work, nursing, retailing and trade and industrial work preparation in cooperative programs.

Not included in the survey but who likely graduate with marketable skills are students in food service and data processing (for which students travel to Oakland Community College), welding classes at Farmington High School and students of some business education, shop and home economics teachers who do not meet vocational certification requirements.

Excluded also are those in first year shorthand and typing classes and those in pre-vocational classes who might well be considered employable.

Another fact turned up by the survey is that those with training in some area are more employable, even though they take jobs in another field, than those with no job training at all.

Among co-op graduates, 57.2 per cent were employed or available for employment. Of these, 57.9 per cent were employed in occupations for which they trained, 26 per cent were employed in unrelated occupations, and seven per cent were employed part-time. Only 10 per cent were seeking work compared with current unemployment rate of 21 per cent in their age group for the metropolitan area.

A TOTAL of 37.7 per cent of co-op graduates were continuing school part-time. Of these, 50 per cent were enrolled in programs related to their co-op training and 32 per cent were working part-time in co-op or related jobs.

Among graduates enrolled in vocational education classes but not participating in the co-op program, 59.3 per cent were employed or available for employment. Of these, 46.8 per cent were employed full-time in occupations for which they were trained, and 31.3 per cent were employed in unrelated occupations.

Another 9.9 per cent were employed part-time, and 11.4 per cent were seeking work compared with the 21 per cent metropolitan average for the same age group.

Another 37.7 per cent continued school full-time, of which 38 per cent were enrolled in related programs and 17.7 per cent were working part-time in a job related to their occupational preparation.

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
