Honored At Banquet

FARMINGTON Police officers from Farmington Township were honored recently at special ceremonies and a dinner held at the Botsford Inn.

Twelve of the officers were specially honored when they received awards for meritorious work performed while on duty. Honored were:

Lt. Russ Conway, for his work in the investigation and apprehension of a burglary suspect, and of a manslaughter defendant, and in an extortion case.

DET. SGT. George Maier for his work on a rape case, a burglary and "investigative efficiency."

Det. Gordon Ross, for his work in narcotics.

Officer Guy Lasich for saving a life.

Officer Bill Hoelt, also for saving a life.

Officer Dale Hall for work in a manslaughter case, and for the capture of a rape suspect.

Edmund Wozniak for work in a burglary case.

Supervisor Earl Teeples (formerly Det. Sgt. Teeples) for his efforts in capturing a bank robber, and work in a rape and manslaughter case.

John Polder for organizing the auxiliary mounted police unit.

Wayne Johnson, for saving the life of a baby.

Tom Godwin and Brad Schwartz for their actions in stopping a burglary.

TEEPLES TOLD the group that all communities should honor their officers in this manner. Among the speakers was Redford Township Police Chief Edwin Gleza, president of the Wayne County Chiefs Association.

"Too frequently we fail to recognize these officers for the untiring services in our behalf. Too long we have just accepted police services as 'what we pay our taxes for,'" Teeples said.

Parents Warned

Of Mini-Bike Law

Farmington Township police chief Irving H. Yakes reminded parents Monday that his department was strictly enforcing the laws on mini-bikes. Yakes said:

"The policy of this department has always been to have the mini-bike brought to the station and placed in storage. The youth is taken into custody at the same time."

"Parents are called and advised by the officer on the case. A tow bill is due for hauling the mini-bike into the police station."

"The lesson is costly and yet some parents continue to ignore the law by permitting their children to operate these mini-bikes on a public road. Mini-bikes are not equipped to qualify as a legal motor vehicle and therefore must be used only on private property."

"Permission must be obtained, in writing, from the owner of private property or a parking lot if the mini-bike is to be operated off the owners own premises."

"Summer once again brings out the mini-bike complaints as these machines take to the public thoroughfares."

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CRUSHED STONE FOR DRIVEWAYS

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NOTICE

All interested citizens are advised that the Michigan Department of State Highways is proposing a change to the plans for Northwestern Highway at the Orchard Lake Road interchange from those displayed at the public hearing held October 13, 1966.

The proposed change includes the addition of a ramp in the northwest quadrant of the interchange. This ramp will provide direct access from southbound Orchard Lake Road to Northwestern Highway in either direction. The addition of the ramp will require the acquisition of right-of-way from seven additional properties along the west side of Orchard Lake Road north of Northwestern Highway. The right-of-way for the remainder of the interchange will remain as presented at the public hearing.

Under provisions of federal law, any citizens who would be affected by the proposed change may request in writing that a formal public hearing be held, concerning the social, environmental and economic effects of this proposal.

Such a written request should be mailed to G. Robert Adams, Public Hearings Engineer, Michigan Department of State Highways, State Highways Building, Drawer K, Lansing, Michigan 48904. The request must be received on or before August 20, 1971.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election will be held in Farmington Public School District, County of Oakland, and State of Michigan, on Monday, the 22nd day of August, 1971, for the purpose of submitting the following proposition:

Shall the limitation on the total amount of general ad valorem taxes which may be imposed for all purposes in any one year upon real and tangible personal property in Farmington Public School District, Oakland County, Michigan, be increased as provided in Section 6, Article IX, of the Constitution of Michigan for a period of one (1) year from 1971 to 1972, by three and one half (3 1/2) mills on each dollar of \$50 per \$1,000 of the assessed valuation of property as finally equalized, for the purpose of defraying a part of the operating expenses of the school district?
