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RURAL TEACHING APPLICATIONS SHOW MARKED INCREASE

Economic conditions are affecting the supply and demand of rural teachers according to Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, Superintendent of Public Instruction. A survey made one year ago by the Department of Public Instruction showed a shortage in the number of teachers available for rural positions.

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change in twelve months has been so pronounced that the county normal schools and State Teachers Colleges in many cases have been unable to place their 1938 graduates.

The survey conducted through the County School Commissioner covers 80 out of the 83 counties and shows an adequate or over supply of rural teachers in 78 out of the 80 counties reported. With only 3 counties left to be heard from indications are that the over supply will be about 500 rural teachers. This number includes 77 County Normal Certificates and almost an equal number of Teacher College Limited certificate students who as yet have no positions.
