

MICHIGAN GAINS NOTARY PUBLIC EVERY 12 MINUTES

Every twelve minutes of every working day, Michigan gains another Notary Public. There are now some 40,000 listed in the files of the Department of State.

Appointments are made by the Governor, commissions are issued by the Secretary of State. There are several interesting facts to be found in the records of Leon D. Case, Secretary of State, about this public office which has survived in

modern form from a century old practice in England.

More commissions were issued last year than have been previously issued in any one year; the total exact number of commissions issued per year over a ten year period, is approximately 10,000.

Four Year Term

The commission term is for four years, except when the notary is removed for cause. There is now one notary for every 125 people in the State of Michigan. Any citizen of the State, 21 years of age or over, endorsed by a Circuit or Probate Judge or a member of the Legislature may apply to the Governor for a commission.

A fee of \$1.00 which goes to the state's general fund must accompany the application. The commissions are sent to the County Clerks, who notify the applicants. Applicants must then file bonds of \$1,000.00 each and pay the County Clerk a fee of fifty cents. If the bond is not filed within ninety days the commission is withdrawn.

Ample notice of change of address should be given when moving. Notice should be given before changing if possible.

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Sales Tax Yields \$3,737,929.97 In August

Michigan's sales tax produced a yield of \$3,737,929.97 during August and the use tax produced an additional \$55,458.61. It was revealed in the figures released by Draper Allen, managing director of the State Board of Tax Administration.

The receipts during the month just closed were a million dollars less than the same month a year ago and dropped \$101,301.77 under the July yield this year. The trend from July to August, however, has been downward every year the tax has been in effect.

Allen pointed out that the seasonal decline reflected in the August collections was only 2.7 per cent. This act, he said, offered some encouragement inasmuch as in other years the August receipts have ranged from four to 12 per cent lower than July.

Use tax collections last month were \$3,000 higher than the preceding month.

Report Made On State's ERA Fund

Federal funds amounting to \$27,888,369.35 were allocated to the State of Michigan under the Emergency Relief Appropriation Act of 1933, 1935 and 1937, according to a report covering the period from April 8, 1935 to June 30, 1938 made public recently by Abner E. Larned, State Director for the National Emergency Council for Michigan. Of the \$25,237,659.03 expended during this period, \$74,634,690.34, was disbursed during the past fiscal year, which ended June 30.

Mr. Larned listed the principal purposes for which the money was expended and the amounts spent during the period April 8, 1935 to June 30, 1938, as follows:

Agriculture, exclusive of Public Roads and Farm Security Administration, \$2,172,740.83; Public Roads, \$1,512,857.20; Farm Security Administration, \$7,513,512.79; Civilian Conservation Corps, \$20,246,421.90; Federal Emergency Relief Administration, \$30,712,432.32; Public Works Administration, \$12,522,366.48; Works Progress Administration, \$165,900,942.74; and other Federal agencies \$10,394,575.66.

Expenditures from the ERA Act of 1935-36-37 during the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1938, amounted to the following:

Agriculture, exclusive of Public Roads and Farm Security Administration, \$1,273,008.79; Public Roads, \$917,016.46; Farm Security Administration, \$2,055,848.08; Civilian Conservation Corps, \$390,290.03; Public Works Administration, \$4,364,329.42; Federal Emergency Relief Administration, \$60,855,154.41; and other Federal agencies, \$5,004,561.23.

Mr. Larned pointed out that the Bureau of Public Roads, the Civilian Conservation Corps and the Public Works Administration have expended additional funds received from other appropriations.
