

Do Automobiles Kill Much Wild Life?

Whether the killing of hundreds of animals on Michigan highways and roads is having any serious effect on game supplies is a question now under study by state game investigators.

That the traffic toll on bird and mammal life in large is generally admitted; what the effect is on the total number of animals is not known.

Among recent reports received by the game division of the department of conservation was one from George Petrie, of Ionia, who reported keeping a record of animals he found dead along the 18-mile stretch on M-21 between Ionia and Fowler. Mr. Petrie travels the road twice daily. During the five

months from March 1 to Aug. 1, he reported counting 78 dead animals.

Included in the report were 45 rabbits, three fox squirrels, three pheasants, one muskrat and one skunk. In addition eight cats, five chickens, two robins and five other song birds, one turtle and one snake were counted.

HEALTH BULLETIN TELLS STORY OF FIGHT WITH TB

Distributed this week to Michigan rural school children were more than ten thousand copies of the November "Wolverine Health Bulletin," a Christmas seal financed by the Michigan Tuberculosis Association, according to an announcement just released by the Association. Now in its fifteenth year of printing, the "Bulletin" is mailed each month of the school year to Michigan rural schools as an important part of the extensive school health education campaign made possible through the annual sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals.

The November issue of the "Wolverine Health Bulletin" is the first number for each school year," the Association explained. "For the first time the 1938 special Thanksgiving issue contains in supplement form a 'Thanks-for-Health-Day' program for the children. The supplement consists of four dramatic presentations of incidents in the lives of Dr. Rene Laennec, inventor of the stethoscope; Dr. Robert Koch, discoverer of the tuberculosis germ; Dr. Edward Livingston Trudeau, pioneer in the fight against tuberculosis; and Tinar Holboll, originator of the sale of penny Christmas seals to help fight the White Plague.

FORMER PASTORS PREACH IN CHURCH BY TELEPHONE

When the Milton Avenue Evangelical and Reformed Church in Louisville, Ky., recently celebrated its thirtieth anniversary, former pastors of the church participated in person without being actually there.

On the first Sunday devoted to the anniversary, the Rev. M. P. Schoepf, a former pastor of the church, gave a ten-minute memorial greeting from his home in Dayton, O., over telephone wires and an amplifying system installed in the church. On the following Sunday, the Rev. C. J. G. Russon, pastor from 1920 to 1925, gave a ten-minute talk from his present church in Indianapolis over a line which had been installed in the Indianapolis church for the occasion. As the time of worship of the two churches coincided, the members of both congregations shared the service.

On the third Sunday of the anniversary, a distance of 2,500 miles spanned between Louisville and Portland, Ore., by wire, when the Rev. A. F. Linsmeier, the first pastor of the church, spoke for ten minutes to the twenty-one surviving charter members of the church and their descendants. He addressed them from his home on the West Coast.

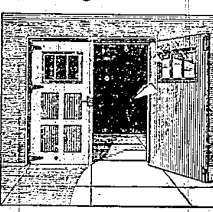


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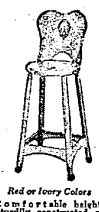
