Dr. Joseph Ester, professor at Rush Medical College, University of Chicago, gave the first lecture on November 2 in which he discussed the changing attitudes of the day and the necessity for a factual approach to marriage.

Other lectures will be given during November and December by Dr. Raymond Squier, a member of the Cornell Medical Center, Dr. Beatrice D. Berle, lecturer at Sarah Lawrence and Vassar Colleges, and Dr. Robert G. Foster of the Merrill Palmer School in Detroit.

CHRISTMAS SEALS CALLED IMPORTANT BY ASSOCIATION

Officers of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association agreed at the Association's recent thirty-first annual meeting at Muskegon that the annual sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals has been a primary factor in helping to stem the tuberculosis death toll in Michigan. The more than 50 per cent reduction in annual tuberculosis deaths during the past 30 years is an achievement which Michigan people themselves have helped to bring about through their generous purchases of the Christmas seals, the officers declared.

Newly-elected president of the Association, Dr. John Alexander, named chest surgeon of Ann Arbor, pointed out that tuberculosis Christmas seals financed organizations fight tuberculosis in Michigan chiefly through health education and case-finding. Through extensive health education activities the Michigan Tuberculosis Association lays before the people throughout the state important facts about controlling and preventing the White Plague; through tuberculosis X-ray clinics, many cases of serious disease are prevented, and others are given the opportunity for immediate treatment in one of Michigan's modern sanatoriums. Dr. Alexander said.

Mr. Curtis M. Wylie of Grand Rapids and Dr. F. Herbert Bartlett of Muskegon were elected respectively first and second vice-presidents of the Association, at the annual meeting. Treasurer Harry D. Bennett of Lansing, who has already served the people of Michigan in that capacity for more than sixteen years, was re-elected. Dr. Bruce H. Douglas of Detroit, former president of the Association was elected a member of the executive committee. Re-elected to the executive committee were Mr. F. E. Mills of Lansing and Dr. George A. Sherman of Pontiac.
