95 Per Cent of Bounties Paid For Coyote Pelts

More than 95 per cent of the money paid out by the State on bounties this year went for coyote pelts, records of the department of conservation show.

Fewer wolves are turned in for bounty because Lobo is growing scarce in Michigan. A bounty also was paid for bobcats in past years, but this was removed by the legislature when this species began to decline in number and when question arose as to the extent of its predation, combined with demands from sportsmen who enjoy bobcat hunting, however, although there is no price on the bobcat, it is not protected.

Predatory animal contracts issued up to Oct. 1 this year totalled 1,323 on which bounties amounting to \$22,970 were paid. Included in the take were 1,293 coyote hides and 30 wolf hides. The coyotes were made up of 487 males, 426 females and 389 pups. Thirteen of the wolves were males, 10 were females and seven were pups.

CHIPS TAKE SLICE OF STATE'S SPUDS, FARM EXPERT SAYS

Michigan's potato crop, second largest in the nation in 1938, will deliver nearly three-fourths of a million bushels to a specialized food industry, that of making potato chips, it is estimated by H. C. Moore, farm crops extension specialist at Michigan State College.

Moore has occasion to know, for some of the experimental work in production and storage of potatoes by the college staff concerns the best varieties, sizes, shapes and culture and storage for ideal tubers for making chips.

Russet Ruralis, Chippewas and Katahdins, three important varieties in Michigan, seem to be almost ideal for this special treatment. Shallow eyes and smooth surface are desirable.

In storage tests the buyers pay more for those potatoes which have been kept not below 40 degrees Fahrenheit. Best results in chips seen to be obtained when the storage temperature is maintained to 50 to 60 degrees two weeks before they go into the chip factory.

During the processing the potatoes are scrubbed and sliced and then soaked in water after slicing. Just before these slices are dropped into hot fat they are surface dried. Several large establishments in Detroit and others scattered throughout the state are in the business of making and distributing potato chips.

Up at Cadillac the Michigan Potato Growers' Exchange has started the manufacture of potato chips. Since June the exchange has been merchandising the food product under the name "Miss Michigan" in several sizes or packages.

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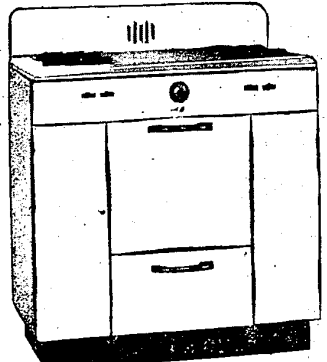
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
