Three Positions Open, Commission Announces

The United States Civil Service
Commission has announced open
competitive examinations for the
positions named below. Applica-
tions will be accepted not later
than the closing dates specified
in each case.

Scientific Aid (Graphic Arts),
\$3,800 a year, U. S. National Mu-
seum, Smithsonian Institution. Re-
quirements: high school education, and spe-
cialized experience are required. Per-
sons who do not meet the edu-
cational requirement will be given
a mental test. Applicants must not

have passed their 40th birthday,
Closing date Feb. 13.

Assistant Wool Technologist,
\$2,600 a year, Bureau of Agricul-
tural Economics. College education
or study in a textile school, and
experience are required. Certain
graduate study may be substituted
for the experience. Applicants must
not have passed their 40th birth-
day. Closing date Feb. 13.

Senior Field Representative,
\$3,800 a year, Field Representative,
Department of Labor. Expe-
rience involving the development of
improved labor standards, or the
administration of labor laws, is
required. Applicants must not have

passed their 53rd birthday. Closing
date Feb. 14.

Full information may be ob-
tained from the Secretary of the
United States Civil Service Board
of Examiners at the post office or
customhouse in any city which has
a post office of the first or sec-
ond class, or from the United States
Civil Service Commission, Wash-
ington, D. C.
