WHO WROTE IT?



HE has written hundreds of popular songs, many included in the twenty-five musical comedies which he has composed by the time he had reached the age of thirty-five.

He was born in New York City on January 17th, 1885. Graduated from high school in Newark, N. J. Studied at the New York College of Music, traveled while still in his teens to Germany. He went from there to England, where he became interested in the theatre. He haunted the office of Charles Froberman, finally met a great producer by accident and was rewarded with a job at fifteen dollars a week.

He came back to America as something of an expert on English musical comedies, and was first heard in his own right with the production of "The Red Petticoat" in 1911. In 1914 he wrote "The Girl From Utah" in which Julia Sanderson sang "They Didn't Believe Me". That was the year the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers was founded and he was one of its first members. Then followed a series of Broadway successes culminating in "Show Boat" with its great song "Ol' Man River". Since then he has written nearly a dozen other musical comedies and has worked for the films.

His name is Jerome Kern.

GASOLINE SALES FOR PAST YEAR DROP 5 PER CENT

Figures recently released by Harry P. Kelly, Secretary of State, from the gasoline tax division of the Department of State show that Michigan motorists used some 58,327,605 fewer gallons of gasoline in 1938 than they did in 1937.

The revenue collected by the gasoline tax division for the calendar year of 1938 amounted to \$29,028,512.97 as compared to the 1937 collections of \$30,778,353.12, or an approximate decrease in revenue of 5.7 per cent, or 5 1/2 percent.

This decrease in the use of gasoline is attributable to the general business conditions and to the increase in mileage now obtainable with the newer modeled automobiles.

The figures for the year just passed, however, represents an increase in gasoline consumption of 69,994,023 gallons of gasoline, or an 8 1/2 per cent increase over the calendar year of 1936. The collection of revenue received for December shows the highest December collection in the history of the gasoline tax division. Collection for the month show an increase of \$2,184,020 over 1937 and \$2,123,153.92 over the same period in 1936.

This revenue derived from the tax of 3 cents per gallon imposed on all gasoline used in propelling motor vehicles on the public highway, is used exclusively for highway purposes including the payment of public debts incurred there of, the maintenance of our present highway system and the building of new highways.

Social Security Apart From State Aid

The fact that a person works for an employer who is covered by the old age insurance part of the Social Security Act does not necessarily mean that worker is entitled to unemployment compensation if he becomes unemployed.

This statement was made today by Walter B. Redman, manager of the Social Security Board field office in Pontiac.

"All employers of one or more, in commerce or industry, are usually covered by the Social Security Act's old age insurance plan," Mr. Redman said.

"But in Michigan only those employers of eight or more persons come under our State's unemployment insurance law. Therefore in the smaller establishments workers may be covered under the old age insurance plan but not unemployment insurance benefits if they become unemployed," Mr. Redman added.

The State employment offices should be consulted by those who believe they may be entitled to job insurance benefits, as these payments are made entirely by the State, Mr. Redman added. "The only federal participation is through the grant to the State
