

Hepner Forms Group To Foster Justice

A committee has been formed by a Farmington Township merchant to assist individuals who have or might be made the brunt of an injustice because of an erroneous attack.

The group is now in its embryonic stage according to organizer Richard Hepner, a merchant with a retail clothing store in Demery's Shopping Center.

HEPNER SAID his committee has a two-fold purpose: specifically to assist Aldo Vagnozzi whose reputation he said has been damaged by an assault and battery charge, and, generally, to assist anyone else who might become the victim of an erroneous attack.

Hepner explained he has been in business for 12 years in the township but, being a Birmingham resident, has not

become embroiled in local politics.

"I am not aligned with any local politician or political group but am taking this action because I've reached a point where I must become involved."

He added he was willing to risk any threat to his economic well-being for the sake of justice.

Hepner said his decision to form the committee became final after reading a letter to the editor in the Aug. 19 edition of the Farmington Forum written by Mrs. Mary Kenney, wife of the leader of the campaign to recall Vagnozzi and two other trustees from the Farmington Board of Education.

"after Dr. Kenney and I became involved in the school board activities our Observer paper we had received for nothing was cut off."

Hepner said he investigated and discovered that in June of 1971 the Kennys asked their newboy to discontinue delivery of the Enterprise & Observer because they felt this paper was biased and refused to print certain things the Kennys wanted published.

Hepner was also told that the newboy who delivers on Mrs. Kenney's street has 97 customers of whom 75 paid for their papers during this summer.

Hepner said "I have known Aldo for many years and if a letter is printed from the plaintiff in this case that is totally false then our committee can do work for Aldo without interfering with the due process of law."

occurred in June. Election officials established two lines for voters at each precinct instead of the normal one, and names were allowed to wait entry in the poll books until after voters had entered the voting booths.

DR. MERVYN B. ROSS, the board's freshman member, said he was pleased that a second millage election had been held, even though he was unhappy at its defeat.

"If we had not had the second election, and they were stuck as they're going to be stuck, they'd have been asking why we didn't give them a second chance," Dr. Ross said. "They've had their second chance."

James Fondenberger, 21883 Colgate, member of a group seeking recall of three board members, said he was "not pleased that millage had to go down" but that he opposed "certain programs the board has put in." He said he referred to the minority understanding and sex education programs due to start in the fall.

He scored what he called the "uncompromising attitude of the board" and indicated he had hoped the recall and anti-millage drives would lead the board to drop the controversial programs before the election to strengthen the tax vote.

"I don't like to take funds away from the public schools," Fondenberger insisted. "If they had done away with sex education and minority understanding, the millage would have passed."

"Words can destroy persons and principles," Hepner added. "and individuals are being treated with great injustice because the truth is being twisted."

About 12 business and professional men have joined his committee thus far and Hepner invites anyone "concerned for the interest of
