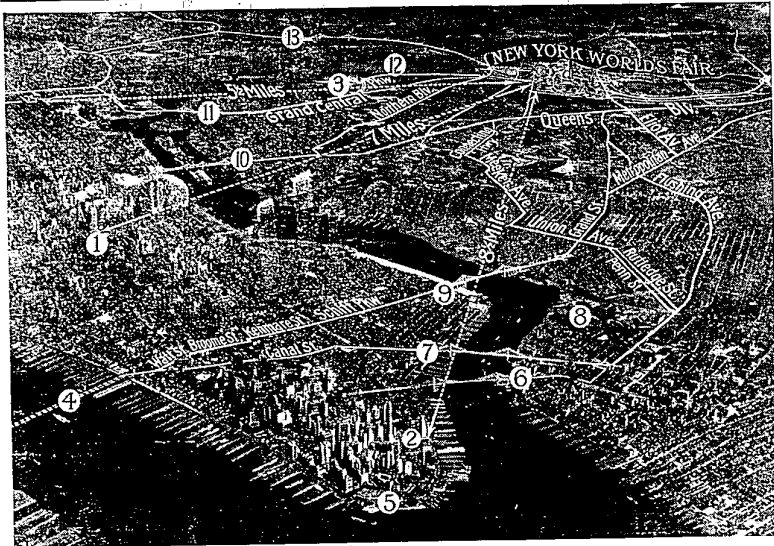


Air Map of Manhattan and New York World's Fair Grounds



NEW YORK—An aerial photographer recently obtained this remarkable picture showing the skyline of New York with its relation to the grounds of the New York World's Fair 1939. An artist has painted on lines indicating distances from certain points in Manhattan to the Fair grounds. These distances, and other facts

concerning road and bridge approaches to the exposition which is preparing to handle 60,000,000 visitors, are:

(1) From Empire State at Fifth Avenue and 34th Street, in the heart of the retail shopping district, to the Fair grounds, 12 miles. (2) From Wall Street, in lower Manhattan, to the Fair grounds,

8½ miles. (3) From the entrance to the Triborough Bridge, 5½ miles. (Motorists can make this trip without encountering a single traffic light). (4) Holland Tunnel from New Jersey, showing route through lower Manhattan across Williamsburg Bridge (No. 9) to roads leading to the Fair. (5) The Battery. (6) Brooklyn Bridge. (7)

Manhattan Bridge. (8) Brooklyn Navy Yard. (9) Williamsburg Bridge. (10) Queensboro (59th Street) Bridge. (11) Grand Central Parkway. (12) North Beach Airport (now being enlarged at a cost of \$30,000,000). (13) New Whitestone Bridge furnishing direct gateway from New England and Canada.

BRITISH DIPLOMAT RONALD STORRS ON TOWN HALL

Sir Ronald Storrs, distinguished British Diplomat, comes to Detroit Town Hall in the Fisher Theater next Wednesday, Feb. 1, at 11 a. m. on his first American lecture tour. He will speak on "The Problem of Palestine."

In the historic drama that culminated in the capture of Jerusalem by Allenby and the Zionist migration to Palestine, Sir Ronald played a leading part. He was a Governor of Jerusalem when the Arab Jewish conflict was brewing, and a strong Governor of Cyprus later when the Greeks were screaming. He was credited with having contributed more than any one else to the sanitation and restoration of Jerusalem. T. E. Lawrence, in "Seven Pillars of Wisdom" called Storrs "the most brilliant Englishman in the Near East." Storrs was always first, he wrote, "and the great man among us." A fluent mastery of Arabic, Hebrew, German, Italian and Greek helped him keep peace among the numerous rival sects of Christianity, and between Jews and Moslems during his term in

Jerusalem.

Storrs began his 30-year career, fresh from Cambridge, with five years in and out of the Egyptian Ministry of Finance. His first real chance came as Oriental Secretary to Sir Eddon Gorst and Lord Kitchener. He shared behind the scenes in the establishment of the Egyptian Sultanate and the beginnings of the Arab Revolution. In 1917, when General Allenby took Jerusalem, Sir Ronald Storrs became Military Governor and was later appointed Civil Governor. From 1932 to 1934 he was Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Northern Rhodesia.

RIGHTS NOT ENDANGERED

The constitutional rights of all citizens to "have their day in court" is not in any way endangered by the standard driver's license law. Any person who has been denied a license or has had his license suspended or revoked, may appeal for a hearing on the matter in the county in which he lives and the circuit court of that county is vested with jurisdiction.

This is one of the important provisions in the law, as recommended by the National Conference on Street and Highway Safety and the National Safety Council.

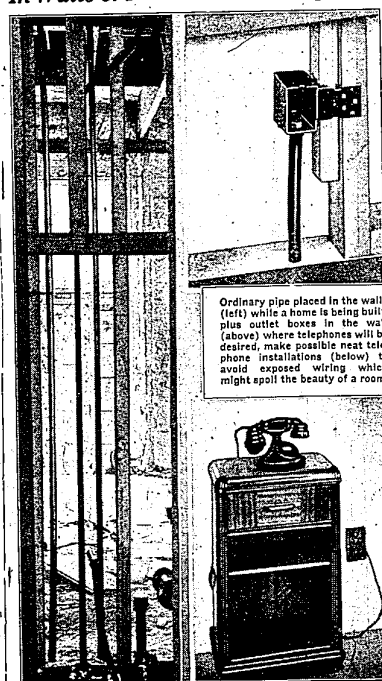
The courts stand ready to set

aside a suspension or revocation on proof that such action was not justified by facts.

LAWSY! NO LAW!

Motorists in many eastern states, many of which have drivers' license laws on their books that date back almost to the turn of the century, are amazed that states in other sections of the country permit their citizens to drive automobiles without complying with the standards and passing tests that are a part of the administration of standard license laws. Massachusetts, for instance, has had a drivers' license law since 1903.

Conceal Telephone Wires in Pipes In Walls of Homes When Being Built



Ordinary pipe placed in the walls (left) while a home is being built, plus outlet boxes in the wall (above) where telephones will be desired, make possible neat telephone installations (below) to avoid exposed wiring which might spoil the beauty of a room.



Stud bracing, fire stops, wall insulation and other features of modern home construction make it difficult, and in many cases impossible, to run telephone wiring inside the walls after a house is built. To eliminate exposed wires on baseboards and moldings, and to avoid unsightly holes in walls and doors, people who are building new homes or remodeling old ones are urged by the telephone companies to make provision for telephone wires during construction.

This can be done, easily and in-

expensively, by placing ordinary pipe or conduit in the walls, running from the basement to the ground floor and to upper stories. Outlet boxes are then placed in the wall at the upper end of the pipes and covered with neat metal plates similar in appearance to wall outlets for floor lamps.

All the telephone companies of the Bell System maintain an "architects and builders' service" to assist in planning for provision to conceal telephone wires in homes and other buildings.
