SCOUTS PREPARE FOR ROUND-UP COMING MARCH 3

The use of the knife and axe is the subject which Farmington's Boy Scout troop number 45 will demonstrate March 2, at the Oakland County Boy Scout Round-up in Pontiac. The scoutmasters of the Southern District of the county formulated their plans for participation in the round-up last week at the home of Neighborhood Commissioner John V. Hunt. Twice a year the Scouts in Oakland County have a get together to become acquainted, show their advancement and to demonstrate the nature of their activities to the public. It will be held in the Pontiac High School.

Troop 45's project in the round-up will consist in a demonstration of the proper use of the knife and axe, emphasizing safety. In addition, the troop will display a number of articles made by troop members with knives and axes.

Troop number 46, which is in the Children's Hospital of Michigan Convalescent Home, will not have anything on display at the round-up, according to Scoutmaster John Samuelson, but he expects the troop to participate in the camporee to be held in the spring.

The Bond School troop, number 48, will present a demonstration of whistle and gesture signals, as taught in the Boy Scout Handbook. These will include signals used in the woods, those used by Indians and those employed by deaf mutes in conversing with each other.

Troop 41 of Walnut Lake will dramatize, "Following the Woodman's Trail." The troop will show the various trail symbols and how they are laid.

With the largest number of Scouts recruited in the southern district of the county in five years, Commissioner John Hunt expects the coming round-up to be well attended. Anyone having any suggestions and wishing to offer any assistance to the scout movement is urged to communicate with Mr. Hunt at his home in Farmington.
