Red Cross To Aid Chile Quake Victims

Word has just been received by the Oakland County Chapter of the American Red Cross, according to Dr. Harold A. Furlong, Chairman, that the Chapter will accept contributions for relief of the distress caused by the recent earthquake in the Republic of Chile.

Norman H. Davis, Chairman of the American National Red Cross, states that the earthquake was one of the most destructive in the history of the Western Hemisphere. It is expected that the dead will exceed 30,000 and the injured 60,000. Vaccines, dressings, ether, surgical instruments, splints and x-ray plates are badly needed.

President Roosevelt has issued an appeal that individuals, institutions and organizations give prompt and practical help to the thousands of individuals in Chile who have been overtaken by this tragic catastrophe.

Advocates Increasing Diesel Oil Tax



Recommendations for legislation to increase the tax on Diesel fuel and to protect Michigan roadists were made this week by State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner.

The commissioner urged a tax increase in line with a conclusion that Diesel units obtain 69 per cent more miles per gallon of fuel than gasoline units operating on Michigan highways. The conclusion was included in a report of a nation-wide factual survey on the problem by the research and testing division of the state highway department.

In urging the increase to "remove discrimination against gasoline vehicles and protect our State revenue," the commissioner said he was aware the Diesel truck industry was in its infancy. He said, however, that it would be "much fairer to the industry" to increase

the tax now than later when "the industry has attained greater stature." The tax rate is now 3 cents a gallon, the same as gasoline.

"There is need for an intelligent law to protect our roadists against grotesque signs, hot dog stands, broken down trucks, and all the other developments that ruin the beauty of a matchless landscape," the commissioner said. "We want particularly to protect our strictly tourist routes against such encroachments."

The commissioner's recommendations were made at the second annual banquet of the Michigan Good Roads Federation at Grand Rapids.

Price of Illegal Deer Runs High, Youth Finds

Probate Judge Derham has pretty well taken care of a young deer law violator's evenings and Saturday and Sunday mornings for the next several weeks.

When the violator, a minor, pleaded guilty to illegal possession and transportation of deer, Judge Derham handed out a triple sentence, to wit:

He must be in his home not later than 10:30 every evening. The probationary period was fixed at six months.
