NYA Educational Project For Unemployed Youth

Quartered in an abandoned formerly house here, 28 young men, representatives of Michigan's unemployed rural youth, are studying scientific agriculture at Michigan State College this winter, paying their way by working 70 hours a month for the National Youth Administration in the college barns and laboratories. The studies they are taking in the Short-Course Department of Michigan State, it is believed, will prove beneficial in their life work—farming.

These aspiring farmers come from all over the State—from Branch County on the Indiana border to Marquette on the shores of Lake Superior. In accordance with NYA regulation, their ages range from 18 to 25. Carefully selected by the State's County Agricultural Agents in cooperation with the local NYA supervisors, they have been outstanding members of their communities, leaders in high school and 4-H club activities. In school and in life they are obtaining a thorough grounding in the principles of scientific agriculture, an opportunity that would have been denied them.

This novel rural work project started operation on the first of the year under the direction of NYA Supervisor Leslie A. Wilcox. Because the youths work as well as study, they will graduate in May 1, twice the length of the regular Short course students' term. Plans formulated by Dean E. L. Anthony of the School of Agriculture and Orin W. Kaye, State Director, and the NYA, call for a new group of students to start the course at the end of the four-month period.

The average day at this residential work center finds the 28 young men going to classes from 8 to 12 in the morning and working at jobs directly related to their own academic instruction during the afternoon. The boys maintain their own quarters, making beds, sweeping floors and helping the cook furnished by the Works Progress Administration. Organized athletics in the college gymnasium and study periods at night, both in the residence and in the college library, are also included in the day's activities.

These youths, hand-picked from hundreds of applicants, are paid \$25 a month by the NYA for their work. Their quarters are run on a cooperative basis and each must pay his pro rata share of the food, fuel, books, text-books and personal supplies are met by the individual student, for which he receives the facilities of the college library, gymnasium and basketball court.

The most intensive correlation of study and work-experience on any NYA work center or resident work project in the State is a feature of this program. The first month has proved successful since its inception, according to Dean Anthony and Supervisor Wilcox, and when it is completed May 1, these 28 Short Course students will graduate with the right to earn a living from the soil.

Wages and Hours Posts Are Being Offered

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced that it will accept applications not later than March 6 for the positions named below.

Consultant in employee-employer relations, \$5,600 a year. Office of Education, Department of Interior. Applicants must not have passed their 33rd birthday.

Mediator and principal, senior, and associate mediators, \$3,200 to \$5,600 a year. National Mediation Board and Maritime Labor Board. Applicants must not have passed their 45th and for the other grades they must not have passed their 53rd birthday.

Industrial economist (labor economics), \$3,800 a year, also senior grade, \$4,800 a year, and principal grade, \$5,600 a year. Wage and Hour Division, Department of Labor. Associate industrial economist (labor economics) must not have passed their 53rd birthday; for the associate grade (minimum wage laws) they must not have passed their 45th birthday; and for the assistant grade (minimum wage laws) they must not have passed their 40th birthday.

Agronomist (tobacco investigations), \$3,800 a year, and investigation biologist (tobacco investigations), \$3,200 a year. Bureau of Plant Industry. Applicants for agronomist must not have passed their 35th birthday, and for associate pathologist they must not have passed their 45th birthday.

MODEL OF 1939 FAIR

Motion Picture Shows Century of Lutheranism

The romance of 100 years of Lutheranism will be told in the moving picture film, "The Call of the Cross" at St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church at the corner of Middle Belt & Eight Mile roads on Feb. 17 at 8 p. m. Rev. Paul Graupner is the pastor of the church.

This picture tells the story of the Saxon immigration 100 years ago caused by the liberal and rationalistic attitude of the Saxon State Church on fundamental doctrinal truths.

A small and faithful group, rebelling against the manner in which the Lutheran doctrine was being modernized in the Fatherland, left they could worship according to the dictates of their conscience. Leading their expedition were Pastors Stephan and C. F. W. Walther, two stalwarts, who steadfastly preached the Word of God in its purity.

Continuing, it deals with the anxieties, hardships, and privations of the pioneer life of these immigrants. Without proper housing, water supplies, malaria thinned their ranks rapidly. Further, both the clergy and laity were troubled by perplexing questions. Did the colonists constitute a Christian community with authority to call ministers and did these ministers have the right to hold their office, having left their charges in Germany?

Notwithstanding these and other trying problems, they courageously and with foresight decided on a school of learning in which religion, the languages and the usual academic subjects were to be taught. The big cabin erected was the forerunner of the present Concordia Seminary in St. Louis and 16 sister colleges and seminaries throughout the United States, which have educated thousands of young men for the ministry and teaching profession in the Lutheran Church.

Mops Simplify Cleaning Of Finished Floors

Wood floors with fine finishes, such as shellac, varnish or floor seal, combined with wax, should never be scrubbed with water. Sweeping or dry mopping should be all that is necessary. It appears from information gathered by the agricultural extension service of Michigan State College.

To make a good dry floor mop, the forest products laboratory of the U. S. Department of Agriculture recommends barely dampening a soft cotton mop with a mixture consisting of three parts of kerosene and one part of paraffin oil. When the mop becomes dirty, it should be washed in hot soap and water, dried, and again dampened with the mixture of kerosene and paraffin oil.

Exceptional patches of dirt that cannot be removed in this way may be taken off by rubbing the area lightly with fine steel wool moistened with turpentine. Where the finish is one of the new floor seals, badly soiled spots, such as gray spots where water has stood on the floor for a time, can be sanded by hand, patched with seal, and buffed with a pad of steel wool.

The if the rest of the floor is waxed, the spotted areas should be waxed.

Varnish finish, if kept in good condition, offers protection against water acts; but it does become stained it is not so easily repaired.

The wood experts of the forest products laboratory recommend renewing a wax finish every 4 to 6 months, depending on the amount of wear on the floor.

HOW TO CHECK SPREAD OF TB IS EXPLAINED

Officials of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association pointed out this week the value of modern Christmas seal weapons—the tuberculin test and chest X-ray—in detecting early tuberculosis. The purpose of the tuberculin test, they said, is to find those people, especially children, who have been in contact with tuberculosis.

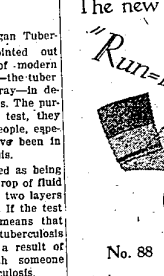
The test was explained as being a simple procedure—a drop of fluid is inserted between the two layers of skin on the forearm. If the test is positive, it usually means that the individual has tuberculosis germs in his body as a result of having associated with someone sick with active tuberculosis.

Emphasis was placed on the fact that the positive test does not mean that the person himself has active disease. A positive reaction, said the Association, should cause no particular worry. However, the need for further examination, by means of the diagnostic chest X-ray, in such cases was stressed.

It is important to tubercle test young people because their contacts are comparatively few, the Association pointed out. When a positive test is found it becomes a good clue to the sick individual who was the source of infection. Tuberculosis is spread from sick individuals to well, and is not inherited.

More than two thousand Michigan people still die from tuberculosis each year, records on file in the offices of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association show. It is important, therefore, to find those who are unintentionally spreading tuberculosis germs. The tuberculin test and X-ray—provided through tuberculosis Christmas seal pennies—are the best protection against the White Plague.
