Advice On The Care Of The Cyclamen

Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of weekly references on the care of common house plants which we believe will be of interest to our readers. There is nothing so discouraging to flower enthusiasts as to see a

once lovely cyclamen plant crumpled and wilted with a perfect crop of incoming buds dried past redemption. This plant tragedy can be avoided, according to Walter Kleinenschmidt, head gardener of the University of Michigan Botanical Gardens, if the plant is kept cool and in a moderately moist condition.

During the night the plant should be kept in a room where the temperature is from 65 to 65 degrees. By being cooled off at night, the plant will hold both leaves and buds until the last one has pushed up from the base and unfurled its delicate butterfly blooms.

The cyclamen does best in a fibrous, loam soil that has good drainage. If the plant is bothered with insects it should be sprayed thoroughly and washed off with a hose.

With proper care it is possible to keep this plant over for several seasons. In the spring the cyclamen, crock and all, should be

planted outside on the north side of a building or in a shady spot and watered once a week. In the early fall, before the new roots are very well developed, the corn, or short bulb like stem, should be transplanted into a slightly larger crock and left outdoors until cool weather sets in.

During the summer the plant will be quite straggly and shabby looking but towards fall a new crown of leaves will appear, and by Christmas it will again be covered with butterfly blooms.
