ISOLATE CARRIERS OF TB GERMS. DOCTOR URGES

"The hub of tuberculosis control lies in finding and isolating the carriers of tuberculosis germs!" Dr. H. E. Kleinschmidt, Director of Health Education at the National Tuberculosis Association, declared this week at the 34th annual meeting of the Grand Rapids Anti-Tuberculosis Society, affiliated with the Michigan Tuberculosis Association. Dr. Kleinschmidt's topic was "Help Find Early Tuberculous." It was explained that in fighting tuberculosis we are dealing with a communicable disease, spread from person to person by a germ. The first step in controlling the disease is to find it, said Dr. Kleinschmidt, pointing out that the White Plague is most likely to occur in certain groups of the population and that case-finding procedures should be concentrated among them. "The fifteen to forty-five age group constitutes one of the hotbeds of tuberculosis," declared Dr. Kleinschmidt. "People in industry, particularly in the unskilled labor class, too, are susceptible to the disease." Careful searching for evidence of the White Plague was urged for these two groups. Although the annual number of cases found might be comparatively few, every discovery would be valuable, it was emphasized. "It would be highly advisable for every young person and every person in the industrial group to have a tuberculin test. If the test is positive, indicating that at some time or other tuberculosis germs have entered the body, the individual should have further examination by means of the X-ray. The X-ray shows whether or not the lungs have been damaged. Not many cases of actual disease will be found, but every one will be of extreme importance, particularly if discovered in the early, symptomless stages. Then the individual can be removed from contact with others for his, as well as their, protection. Too, the original source of infection can be traced more easily."

U. HOSPITAL HAD 30,000 PATIENTS IN '38

Nearly 30,000 patients, from every county in Michigan, and 1,330 out-of-state patients were admitted to the University of Michigan Hospital last year, according to the President's Report for 1937-38. Of this number 23,665 patients were hospitalized and received 410,708 patient-days care during the twelve-month period. Bed capacity of all divisions of the University Hospital, including the Main Building, West Hospital, South Department, Contagious Maternity, Thomas Henry Simpson Memorial Institute, and the Neuro-psychiatric Institute, the report shows, was 1,837 during 1937-38. A comparative statement of patients registered shows that 14,700 of those admitted were men and 15,642 women. American-born patients numbered 25,619, while foreign-born patients totalled 3,623. The average daily number of patients was 225, and the average length of patient visits at the Hospital was 17.4 days. Age distribution charts of patients reveal that the greatest number of patients were between the ages of 20 and 24. This group constituted 8.99 per cent of the total number of patients, and the average stay made up the second largest group.

PRACTICE PHONE COURTESY IN SCHOOL

Because telephoning ranks second in frequency among the duties of a secretary, the North Dakota School of Science has established a course in business telephone manners, a system comprising a master telephone, two additional telephones, and 15 sets of earphones has been installed. A business problem is carried out in conversation over the two telephones between students acting as secretary and patron or customer. The instructor listens in over the master telephone, interrupting now and then with a suggestion, while the rest of the class reap the benefits by listening in on the whole thing through the earphones.

BULLET IS SLOW COMPARED WITH VOICE BY PHONE

If it were possible to fire a shot from a modern high-power rifle on the Atlantic Coast and the bullet could travel across the ocean at undiminished speed, it would arrive in London more than an hour and a two days before it could reach New York.
