ONLY ONE-SIXTH OF FARM ACREAGE IS FERTILIZED

CHICAGO.—Only one out of every six acres planted to farm crops in the United States annually is fertilized in any one year, yet the increased production from the fertilized land amounts to about 15 per cent of the nation's total crop output, according to a survey made by the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

"Less than 60,000,000 acres of America's 360,000,000 annual crop acreage are treated with fertilizer

every year," the survey sets forth. "Consumption for the entire country is about five pounds per acre."

"If America should stop using fertilizer, it would be necessary to farm at least 30,000,000 additional acres at a cost of about \$350,000,000 annually. Fortunately, the necessity of an ever-increasing program of soil conservation and improvement in American farms through the use of commercial fertilizers is being more and more recognized."

Through the efforts of agricultural colleges, state experimental stations and county agents, farmers are becoming increasingly aware that an investment in nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash will pay valuable dividends in replenished fertility."

Fertilizer Pays Dividends

Survey Shows Corn Belt Farmers Favor Fertilizer

CHICAGO.—How corn growers themselves feel about the subject of fertilizer was revealed in a survey of representative farmers in thirteen corn belt states.

A total of 17,185 farmers were interviewed about their experience in fertilizing corn. Of this number, 14,865 reported they had used fertilizer. Of these, 13,229 reported earlier maturity of their corn as a result.

Better market quality was reported by 12,243 farmers, which meant better feeding quality as well.

Out of the 14,865 farmers, 14,331 said that fertilizer gave corn a quicker start. Increases in the value of their crop as a result of using fertilizer ranging from \$4.11 to \$15.94 per acre, were reported by these 14,865 farmers.

ANTI-BILLBOARD BILL HEARING ON APRIL 26

Lansing—April 26 has been set as the date for hearings before the Senate state affairs committee on the Baldwin bill designed particularly to protect Michigan tourists from distraction by unsightly billboards.

Garden clubs, tourist associations, and other groups interested in the scenic beauty and safety of Michigan highways are planning to appear at the hearings. The session is scheduled for 10 a. m.

Introduced by Senator Joseph A. Baldwin, the bill would authorize the state police and state highway commissioners to designate certain highways as scenic or tourist roads. Billboards and signs would be banned on these particular roads. The proposed law would license advertising signs and provides for specifications to govern such signs or billboards. Certain provisions of the bill prohibit billboards within 500 feet of intersections and set up other restrictions designed to protect motorists. Included among the special provisions of the bill is one exempting signs erected by farmers, gas station operators, or others who wish to advertise the products for sale on the land on which the sign is erected.

Peterborough, N. H.—Two Guernsey cows owned by F. L. Dunn of Farmington, Mich. have just finished new official records for production which entitles them to entry in the Advanced Register of The American Guernsey Cattle Club. These animals include seven year old Brookwood Priscilla 36887 producing 12184.1 pounds of milk and 633.7 pounds of butter fat in class A, and two and one-half year old Brookwood Polly Pride

429785 producing 12830.6 pounds of milk and 551.5 pounds of butter fat in class FF.
