Free Speech

They realize that each man has the right to state his opinions regarding national conduct, but will these Americans who are so lenient in their tolerance, try to deny the government, where free speech is made possible? What to do in the matter of permitting such gatherings is a real problem for public officials to solve.

Newspaper As Community Builder

Says Edward Davenport, expert counsellor, sage advisor, and creator of sound, money-making programs:

"Before merchants can build a big business they must either select or help to build a good community. While it is true that individual merchants do contribute taxes and employment to a certain number of people in their respective communities, the merchant's business must, of necessity, live off the community. Leaving aside civic pride, every department store owner and every merchant should guard against the weakening of any link in the chain that makes for a strong community, and no link in this chain, in my opinion, can begin to compare in size and importance with the newspaper played by your local newspaper."

"As merchants, we can contribute certain amounts of cash, we can contribute our time on committees, but in the end it falls upon the shoulders of the newspaper of your city to get you new aqueducts when you need them for progress, new Union Terminal stations, better school conditions, promotion of beneficial traffic changes, new Golden Gate Bridges, and the promotion of an endless number of links that make up the chain of community health, progress and financial security."

Baseball's Centenary

Little did Abner Doubleday, a West Point cadet, realize, back in 1839, when he decided to formulate new rules to replace the old camp of "town ball" in vogue before that time and laid out the first baseball diamond in his home town of Cooperstown, New York, that his creation was destined to become the great American game, the delight of millions of sports enthusiasts, and the beloved activity of youth and not so young from kids in the corner saloons to schools and colleges and trained professionals.

Doubleday little realized, no doubt, that his game would have tremendous popularity and nationwide financial support, providing occupation for hundreds of professional players. He little realized, perhaps, he was giving America a new field for mass entertainment.

The rules, the style of play, the equipment and many factors about the game have changed greatly from the original plan and playing of the game—but the spirit and significance of baseball remains the same today, a clean, competitive, skillfully played and hard fought contest, in which few boys for generations have not experienced the thrill of participation.

On this, baseball's hundredth birthday, Americans may well pause in remembrance of Abner Doubleday, and do honor to the memory of this man whose creative ability gave America a sport, a contest, a real entertainment, an outlet for energy, a competitive activity, the social and human results of which are far more important than we of today realize.

Workers Must File Claims Within 14 Days

Many workers face the loss of benefits for partial unemployment to which they may be entitled because of their failure to file claims within the period set down by the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission. It was announced today by John C. Towner, Executive Director of the Commission.

"To receive benefits for partial unemployment," Towner explained, "eligible workers must file their claims not later than fourteen days from the end of the period for which they claim benefits."

Public Hearing Held On Baldwin Bill

Over five hundred Michigan residents crowded the Senate Chamber of the State Capitol in Lansing recently to hear the Baldwin "Little Blue" Bill (Senate Bill 50) discussed in a public hearing before the Judiciary Committee. Speakers appeared both in opposition and support of the bill.

It was pointed out that the bill does not define seditions or subversive activities and said that no two people in a room would agree on a definition. Statements of Lincoln, Jefferson and other great leaders would be construed by some as seditious, it was stated.

Women Change Names On Security Cards

Women who have married since obtaining social security accounts are urged to correct the records of the federal agency to show their married names. The social security office now has a form which is used to make these corrections. Employees are not advised of such changes, the purpose being merely to keep the records of the social security board accurate and up to date, to expedite payment of future old-age insurance benefits.

HAVE YOU A SKELETON IN YOUR CLOSET?

The generally accepted meaning of the word "skeleton" is a relic of something that once was alive, but is now just a skeleton. "Skeletons in your closet" is supposed to cause shivers and much hush-hushing in your family, but strange as it may seem, there are, in numerous families, "skeletons" hanging in dark closets—in the attic—and the family pays little or no attention to them. Not only do these "skeletons" do no good but they actually deprive many people of the comforts of life which they might enjoy if these "skeletons" were "brought back to life."

Oh, yes, there is such a thing. The "skeletons" referred to are clothing, shoes, hats and other discarded apparel, as well as rugs, furniture and so on that once gave pleasure and comfort but now have been abandoned because newer things have taken their place. Wild Life Nests Need Protection

Much of Michigan's reputation as a good hunting grounds for next fall will be determined by weather and farm operations to wild life in the next few weeks, suggests R. G. Hill, apiculturist in game management at Michigan State College.

Late burning of dry grass and stubble fields, late plowing and uncontrolled cats and dogs likely take heavy toll of the spring hatching of pheasants, quail and partridge and affect the new crop of cottontail rabbits.

"Cats and dogs are valuable in a farming community," Hill admits, "but if they are not properly controlled these animals can be classified among the worst enemies to wild life especially during nesting and brooding seasons."

land County, reports Mrs. Dorothy J. Clark, home management supervisor of the Farm Security Administration at Pontiac.

Many families in the county have been able to meet all vegetable requirements of the family throughout the entire year because of fresh, stored or canned vegetables supplied by the gardens. In addition, meals can be made more interesting because of the variety available.

According to the home supervisor, gardens are planned to furnish a good supply of fresh vegetables needed during the summer months and enough addition so the homemaker may eat about 25 quarts of tomatoes and 35 quarts of other kinds of vegetables for each member of her family. In addition, three to five bushels of potatoes and three to four bushels of vegetables, such as carrots, cabbage, beets, rutabagas, and turnips, are recommended for storage for each person.

After carefully considering the preferences of the family and their requirements to provide an adequate year around diet, the family garden is planned to meet these specifications.

"During the year, FSA borrowers who need the help are advised as

to the best methods of caring for their gardens and preserving the produce by canning, drying and storing," Mrs. Dorothy J. Clark said.
