COUNTY YOUTH
RECEIVE NYA
SCHOOL AID

The Michigan National Youth Administration is employing 226 needy youth on its school aid program in Oakland County, according to Orin W. Kaye, State Director.

Youth who are acceptable as eligible for NYA school-aid by the school authorities, are employed on part time projects for which they are paid a maximum of six dollars a month and which are supervised by school officials themselves. This amount often means the difference between attending school and being forced out. Young people in financial need are provided with a sufficient amount of money to pay necessary expenses such as books, lunches, transportation and, in many instances, clothes.

The type of project on which the youth are employed is designed to provide work experience in their chosen vocation wherever possible. They are given the opportunity to obtain experience in typing, filing, dictation, bookkeeping, carpentry, dietitian, bookbinding, varnishing, wood working, landscape, window cleaning, book repairing and book-binding and many other occupations which provide vital experience in seeking employment after they have completed their schooling, stated Kaye. A total of 13,555 needy students are now working part time for the NYA, 9,537 of which are in high school and 4,198 in college.

READ ABOUT AT THE UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN

Director of the University of Michigan's Department of Engineering Research since 1920, Dr. Albert E. White has been a leading figure in American metallurgy in both civil and military fields and in the field of administration of research in engineering.

The department of Engineering Research, of which he is the head, was established by the University of Michigan to meet the needs of industrial concerns for fundamental research in engineering.

The staff research in engineering fields, the laboratories, and the equipment of the University's College of Engineering are made available to industry through the Department. The expenses of this research are carried by the firms when the research is done. About 1,200 industrial problems have been brought to the Department for investigation, and, during the last full year of operation, 201 projects were worked on by the Department.

Aside from administration, 249 persons participated in the technical aspects of the research Department's activities, of whom 47 were members of the teaching staff, 10 were full-time research workers, and 192 were students.

Besides its research activities, the Department sponsors various conferences of the technical workers in industry.

Dr. White, the Department's director, was educated at Brown and Harvard Universities, receiving his Doctor of Science degree at the latter in 1928. During the World War he served in various technical capacities for the United States Army as head of the Metallurgical Branch of the Inspection Division

and later as head of the Metallurgical Branch of the Technical Staff. At present he is a Lieutenant Colonel in the Ordnance Department of the Reserve Corps and has been a member of the Metallurgical Research Committee of the American Society for Testing Materials.

He has been a member of the Metallurgical Research Committee of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, the National Research Council, and the Engineering Foundation.
