Best Cooks Get Chance
At Prize In Contest

Michigan's best cooks, especially those who know how to dish up eggs in the tastiest form, have an opportunity to win state and national honors.

Announcement of a \$1,000 egg-meat menu contest which will culminate in national honors in the World's Poultry Congress in Cleveland July 28 to August 7 is made by a national committee and by a specially designated Michigan group. Miss Edna V. Smith, Michigan State College home economics extension service state leader, is chairman of the Michigan Consumers' committee for the poultry congress.

Entries must be submitted with menus and recipes by June 1 to permit selecting the five best in Michigan.

It is a menu for one meal. The Michigan committee has designated that this should be either a luncheon or evening dinner menu. Eggs used in the menu can be in many forms such as in omelets, as garnishes for salads, or in cakes or pastries. But wherever the eggs appear, the recipe must explain the preparation of the dishes for the entire meal.

Besides state and national honors, the housewife who wins the title will win other prizes. The national crown for the winning cook will have a cash award of \$1,000 attached.

Plans of the Michigan committee include asking or personal appearance during June of those whose names and recipes seem most valuable. Actual preparation will be asked of the cooks during this final state elimination contest.

Seychelle Islands Land Of the 'Forbidden Fruit'

In the Indian ocean, 900 miles east of the coast of Africa, lie the Seychelle islands, so far off the beaten track that mail steamers are a novelty, notes a writer in the Philadelphia Inquirer. There are 60 islands in this remote group, and although they were not discovered until the sixteenth century they seem to enjoy many of the amenities of modern civilization. They are believed to be the remains of an ancient continent that once stretched from India across to Africa.

One man of deep religious faith firmly believed the Seychelles to be the site of the Garden of Eden. Local tradition supports this claim. Here grows the palm tree that bears the coco-de-mer—the 'Forbidden Fruit' of the Bible.

In and about Port Victoria may be seen the huge dragon's blood trees, about 80 feet in height, with long, pendulous branches, bright with sprays of fragrant yellow blossoms. The tree gets its name from the fact that when the bark is scraped it exudes a deep red sap, and the tree looks as if bleeding.

Many varieties of birds are to be found in the Seychelles. The most interesting is the myna, about the size of a blackbird. It has a curious fluttering flight, something like that of a butterfly being blown about in the wind. There are many small sea-gulls. One kind lays its eggs, without any nest, on the bare branch of a tree. The shell holds a form of glue which holds the egg to the tree until the sun hatches it.

Shale Reserves Protect

U. S. From Oil Shortage

NEW YORK—America need not worry about exhausting the automobile fuel supply for at least 2,000 years, according to Hugh D. Miser, chief of the section of fuels of the United States geological survey. Miser said a supply of bituminous substances, even larger than the oil, of barrels of petroleum in known reserves, is sealed in shale reserves.

During the last 20 years new discoveries of petroleum have balanced consumption, Miser said. The extent of the nation's petroleum reserves rests largely with "the geologist to continue to aid in the increasingly difficult problem of discovery, with the engineer to improve drilling technique to increase recoveries and with the chemist to continue improvements in refining practice."

Cassowary Grotesque Bird

If the ostrich is one of the most grotesque and ungainly of birds, his near relative, the cassowary, which roams over New Guinea, runs him a close second. In the Tamarau mountains, says Collier's Weekly, this huge birdlike creature has a heart four times the size of a man's and is covered with long, hairlike feathers. On the end of a scraggy, partly naked and brightly colored neck there is a silky-looking head composed of huge bill and eyes, horn rooster's comb and much more. The natives raise young ones that they find in the jungle and are devoted to them.

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Civil Service Job Open For High School Grad

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an open competitive examination for the position of junior observer in meteorology, \$1,440 a year, Weather Bureau. Applicants must have completed a 4-year high-school course or 14 units of high-school study. Those who do not meet this requirement, but are otherwise qualified, will be given a mental test. Applicants must have reached their 18th but must not have passed their 35th birthday. Applications must be on file with the U. S. Civil Service Commission

not later than April 17. Full information may be obtained from the Secretary of the United States Civil Service Board of Examiners at the post office or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

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
