NORTH EASTON, MASS.—This modern world has the automobile, the steamship, the airplane, and the motor car, but George W. McLaughlin, 68, still lives in the horse and buggy age.

For 30 years, up to a few months ago, he drove a horse and buggy six days a week to Brockton. Up to 10 years ago he was a shoe plant superintendent. He retired but still made the daily trips. Now, however, he goes to Brockton every other day.

His horse is "Hollywood Blackstone," a one-time record trotter, who runs a mile in 2:10.

In the last 30 years McLaughlin figures he has driven his horse and buggy about 150,000 miles. He added:

"I hope 10,000 more can be added to that before I hitch my buggy to a star."

McLaughlin says he is always being urged to go modern and ride in an automobile, but to every one he says:

"I'll stick to my horse."
