Michigan Second In PWA Construction

The \$455,000,000 construction program of Region No. 2 of the Public Works Administration is shifting into high gear after an auspicious start, according to reports to D. R. Kennicott, Regional Director with headquarters in Chicago.

The Region consists of the States of West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan. The 1938 PWA program at Applicants were unable to qualify and after a number of highway im-provements were transferred to the Federal bureau of Public Roads the Federal bureau of Public Roads left a net of 1,384 active projects in the Region. Some of these were multiple unit projects such as Chi-cago's Board of Education single grant which includes seventeen separate schools.

Of these Ja84 projects, 276 were completed before June 1, approximately twenty per cent. Region No. 2 is keeping abreast of its program as latest reports from all over the country to Administrator Harold L tekes show twenty per cent completion. Illinois leads the Region with about 31 per cent of its program completed—65 out of 111 projects.

Michikan is second with 64 out 247 projects or about 25 per cent.

Michigan is second with 64 out of 247 projects or about 26 per cent. Illinois leads in the 'cost of completed projects 22,861,309 with Michigan second with \$2,633,000. Ohio leads in number of completed projects, 74, but it had a total of 473, and the completion is about 16 per cent.

With less than four weeks to go, Michigan anglers are completing preparations for the opening of the lake fishing season Sunday, June 25.

lake (fishing season Sunday, June 25 – Opening of lake fishing marks the lifting of closed season on all Michigan waters except. those closed by a special order. All seasons remain open until Labor Day when the trout season ends except on rainbow and steelhead trout in certain lakes and streams (named in the law.)

Season on largemouth and small-mouth bass runs until December 31 in all lakes and streams accept trout streams and trout lakes. Bluegills and sunfish may be taken until March 31 in non-trout streams and in all lakes except pike lakes and trout lakes.
