

SOUND PLANNING RANKS FIRST AS FSA LOAN BASIS

The willingness of newly loaning farm families to plan future operations carefully and to accept farm and home management guidance, is the principal basis on which Farm Security Administration loans are made, Manley E. Young, local supervisor of Oakland County declared in a recent announcement on eligibility requirements of that agency. There are 554 rehabilitation borrowers of the FSA in this county.

In order to be eligible for a loan the applicant farm family should (1) understand what caused its need for rehabilitation; (2) realize the necessity for careful planning of future operations; (3) be convinced that progress can be made by following a plan and working hard; (4) keep farm and home records and realize that property mortgaged to the FSA must be accounted for.

The rehabilitation program has been in operation in Oakland County for the past four years. In that time, according to Mr. Young, there has been approximately \$55,000,000 loaned to farmers who needed only a little financial help and guidance to work their way back to a self-supporting and independent basis.

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WALLPAPER TONES BECOME MODERN AND STREAMLINED

Color! Never have such soft greyed colors been available in wall coverings. The colors themselves are not new, just the same old spectrum colors of the rainbow, but modern inventions have made it possible to produce the lighter tones of these colors which make for better backgrounds for furnishings than the stronger, harsher colors formerly seen in wallpaper, points out Winifred S. Gettemy, associate professor in retail arts at Michigan State College.

"Decorators are suggesting that the ceiling of a room be a contrasting color to the wall. Perhaps some one color in a pattern may be repeated in plain tones on the ceiling. We will hear such suggested patterns and combinations as a silver ceiling with walls of silver or a white ceiling with walls of a pale blue ceiling with striped yellow walls, or a peach colored ceiling with walls papered in coffee color and beige tones.

Two-Tones Favored
"Two-toned effects of one color are in high favor. All sorts of patterns are seen in two-toned colors, but stripes and streamlines are in the greatest demand."
A scheme for variety suggested by Miss Gettemy as especially good for bedrooms, shows one wall a different color, or one or two walls in pattern and the others plain. For the children's room a new wrinkle is to have one wall only in patterns of Mother Goose characters, or animals, and the other three in a plain background tone on which mirrors or pictures could be hung.

It's unwise, she says, to give a child a nightmare by having Mickey Mouse dancing all over the walls of his room.

Most popular colors in 1939 include all tones of pink, woods rose, coral, dusty pink, crushed raspberry, all tones of blue, grey, soft tan and clear pale yellow.
