**Apple Commission To Be  
Organized This Week**

The commission created by the  
1939 legislature affecting Michi-  
gan's apple industry will have  
completed organization this week,  
according to predictions of Agri-  
cultural Commissioner Elmer A.  
Beamer, named as chairman ex-  
officio of the new group. The  
Apple Commission has met in the  
office of the agricultural depart-  
ment head, naming Roscoe J. Mar-  
tin as secretary-manager-treasurer.

The Apple Commission an-  
nounced that headquarters will be  
at Bangor, at least until after  
meeting early in July, when plans  
are expected to be completed for  
campaign to boost the sale of  
Michigan apples. The law provides  
for the collection of one cent tax  
per bushel on apples for mainte-  
nance of the commission, exempt-  
ing producers of less than 300
