Back-To-School Dates Listed

Farmington's public and parochial school children will return to school next week. Here is a schedule of important back-to-school information. For more details, call the individual school. There are about 18,000 public school students, and about 2,400 parochial students.

PUBLIC GRADE SCHOOLS
All elementary school children should report to school Wednesday, Sept. 8; school will run for a full day. Classes for students in grades one through six at schools requiring bus transportation will be held from 9:30 to 3:30. (not to 3 p.m. as published elsewhere). Kindergarten morning a.m. lasts from 9:25 a.m. until noon. Kindergarten afternoon lasts from 12:55 to 3:30 p.m.
All walking students attending Eagle, Flanders, Kenbrook, Larkshire, Shiawassee and William Grace schools will report one half hour earlier. Grades one through six will attend classes from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m.; kindergarten morning runs from 8:55 to 11:30; kindergarten afternoon from 12:25 to 3 p.m.

JUNIOR HIGHS
Junior high students should report Sept. 8 for a full day, 8:10 until 2:55. Buses start running at 7:30.

HIGH SCHOOLS
All three Farmington high schools begin with a

full day on Wednesday, Sept. 8, 7:40 to 2:15. The buses start picking up at 7 a.m.

FOOTBALL
In the opening high school football games, North Farmington plays Pontiac Northern at home at 2 p.m., Sept. 18. In the other game Harrison plays Farmington High at Farmington High, 2 p.m., Sept. 18.

OUR LADY OF SORROWS CATHOLIC
Half-day orientations for grades seven through nine will be held Sept. 7 to Sept. 10, 9:30 to 12. There is no Sorrows senior high; about 284 are enrolled in the junior high grades. Grades one through six begin Sept. 8 with a full day, 9:30 to 3:30. About 480 are expected in the elementary grades.

OUR LADY OF MERCY CATHOLIC
School opens Sept. 7 for the 1,150 Mercy students in grades 9 through 12, running from 8:30 until 3:15.

ST. FABIAN CATHOLIC
Students attending St. Fabian begin Sept. 8, going from 8:30 until 2:45. The schedule remains essentially the same as last year for the school's 360 students, grades one through six.

ST. PAUL'S LUTHERAN
St. Paul's classes begin Sept. 8 at 8:30, and will go until 3 p.m., for kindergarten through eighth grade. The school has about 185 students. Registration will be held the day before, Tuesday, Sept. 7, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Dear Farmington Resident,

The Executive Board of the Farmington Education Association voted Thursday morning, August 26th, to accept the community offer of financial support for the extra curricular activities in the Farmington Public Schools.

In our opinion, the Association is now in a position requiring immediate clarification. First, the coaches and music teachers are willing to perform their duties at half pay in order to restore such programs as athletics, music, debate and forensics, school newspapers, and yearbooks.

Second, the FEA wants to make it clear that this emergency aid from private community members is a stop-gap measure only. The organization felt that it would be irresponsible to students and community to reject any offer to aid which would give students the opportunity to participate in extracurricular activities. The FEA also felt, however, that it had to be made clear that this will not set a precedent for continued or further reductions of salaries or programs in the future.

One of the main objections to the proposal is that the community may be led to believe that millage votes need not be passed in order to have a full school program. This is not true. Even with the aforementioned extracurricular activities restored, the quality of education in the Farmington Public Schools is still on shaky footing. Elementary music and art are still reduced. Library and counseling services are drastically curtailed, and a staff that stood at over 800 last year now stands at under 750. We must reiterate that this is a one-year proposal only. Though the FEA is grateful for any support by which students will profit, this type of financing is neither acceptable nor feasible in the future.
