'Human Cannon Ball' Need Rigid Training

Cliff Gregg of Plymouth, Wis., who is the human cannon ball, has disclosed some of the secrets of the breath-taking trick which thrills circus and exhibition crowds. Pointing out that the human projectile is fired from a shell of his own each time he is shot from the cannon, Gregg said: "The performer enters a shell that is shaped according to his body dimensions. Compressed air inside the shell violently to the muzzle, which springs back and ejects the performer." Simultaneously, an explosion is set off in another chamber to produce an artillery fire effect.

TAX MONEY MAY BE DEDUCTED BY MOTORISTS

When making out Federal income tax returns, Michigan motorists may deduct money paid out during 1939 as a result of the State's gasoline tax rate of 3 cents a gallon, Howard D. Brown, general attorney for the Automobile Club of Michigan, declared today. Reporting on income tax deductions allowed motorists by reason of car operation, he continued: "Every penny paid to the State in the form of registration and other special fees may be deducted by Michigan motorists. Also, they may deduct amounts paid out in state gasoline taxes when traveling through most of the other states as the Bureau of Internal Revenue now allows full deductions for all but ten states, namely, Alabama, California, Georgia, Mississippi, Nebraska, South Carolina, Tennessee, Utah, Wyoming, and Ohio, where 3 of the 4 cents is deductible."

car. Finance charges, as such, are not deductible and whether a portion of the charge can be deducted as interest depends upon the nature of the contract. A. A. national headquarters, had prepared a booklet listing all deductions that may be made by motorists when making out income tax returns. The Automobile Club of Michigan has a supply of these booklets on hand for motorists when the time comes for them to wrestle with Uncle Sam's annual questionnaire. NEW GADGETS WILL MAKE WASHING MACHINE BETTER

Motor driven pumps for emptying sump water from the tub and centrifugal driers, the new gadgets offered on washing machines. Studies of their efficiencies have led home economics extension specialists at Michigan State College to offer suggestions to those who might plan to make purchases. Either or both of these devices probably will add to the cost of the machine, but the convenience and increased safety may repay this. In studies by the federal bureau of home economics it was found that a power driven washing machine was purchased before other types of electric equipment except in southern states, leading acceptance to offering advice. Centrifugal or spinner driers have outlet holes in a rotating jacket. Water is whirled out of the holes until the clothes are damp, removing more water than the power wringers and saving time. Recommendations are, however, that the wringer type machine may be entirely satisfactory if it is equipped with a safety feature that prevents fingers from being caught in the rollers. There should also be a safety catch within easy reach for instant release of the belt pressure. Other points to scan in considering purchase of a machine include durability of construction, capacity, cost and quiet operation. Three types generally available include rubber, cast-iron and vacuum types. With any selection, it is advisable to follow the manufacturer's directions for operation and care, the home economics specialists report. New England Gourmets Stage 'Chowder' Battle

New Englanders have won a hard-fought battle over whether tomatoes properly deserve a place in clam chowder. The decision of gourmets was that tomatoes should be outlawed from the succulent dish. Now, they have ruled that milk has no place in fish chowder and that the correct liquid is Madeira wine. They based this on a recipe found in an early cook book. Andrew S. Sells, Boston caterer, found the recipe in the "Cook's Own Book," published by Monroe & Francis in 1832. "This receipt (not recipe) is according to the most approved method practiced by fishing parties in Boston harbor," read a preface. It continued: "Chowder—Lay some slices cut from the fat part of the belly-piece of pork in a deep stewpan, mix sliced onions with a variety of sweet herbs and lay them on the pork. Bone and cut fresh cod into thin slices, and place them on the pork; then put a layer of pork, on that a layer of biscuit; then alternately the other materials until the pan is nearly full, season with pepper and salt put in about a pint and a half of water, lay a paste over the whole, cover the stewpan very close, and let it stand, with fire above as well as below, for hours. "Then skip it well, and put it in a dish, pour a glass of Madeira made hot over it, also some Jamaica pepper, stewed mushrooms, and a few slices of butter, brown the paste slightly and lay it over the whole."
