Girl Scout News

The following history of Girl Scouts, is submitted in keeping with the anniversary of its founding, this month.

While living in England, Mrs. Juliette Low of Savannah, Georgia, met Lord Robert Baden-Powell, founder of Boy Scouts, and became deeply interested in the scout movement. She formed a company of Girl Guides among the Highland girls, on her estate in Scotland. Later, she worked with the Girl Guides in London.

From England Mrs. Low carried Girl Guiding to the United States, where she adapted the program and organization to meet the needs of the American Girl. On March 12, 1912, she established the first troop of American girls in her home city of Savannah, Georgia. This day has been designated as the official birthday of the Girl Scout organization in the United States. The name "Girl Scout" was taken by the American organization.

Today there are over half a million Girl Scouts in the United States. The Girl Scout program is intended for girls from seven to eighteen years of age, and designed to attain its objectives with references to specific age groups, with identical aims and objectives, but with activities adapted to the three age groups, the seven (ten-year-old girl (Brownie), the ten to fourteen-year-old girl (Intermediate Girl Scout), and the fourteen to eighteen-year-old girl (Senior Girl Scout and Marine).

Garden Club Women To Enter Flower Show

Mrs. F. J. Nash and Mrs. Karl Ritter, members of the Farmington branch of the National Farm and Garden Club, will have exhibits in the National Flower show, which will be held in Detroit, March 23 to 31.

Mrs. Nash will exhibit a New England table arrangement, while Mrs. Ritter will exhibit a boxwood bouquet. It is expected that a large number of the members of the Farmington club will attend the show as visitors.

Several carloads of azaleas, rhododendrons, magnolias and other southern plants will provide the bloom in the feature garden of the exhibition, which will be held in Convention Hall.

This material constitutes the best the south has to offer, having been chosen by a picked crew of men under Werner M. Hay, designer of the show, from the gardens and nurseries throughout the southern states, over a period of weeks.

Sponsored by the Chrysler Corporation, this garden will be one of the largest ever staged in the middle west, 33,000 square feet. Three large pools in it will be connected by a stream beginning at a waterfall, the largest of the pools to be a wading spot for twelve black and white swans. A reviewing balcony will overlook the garden and tank paths will make it possible to view it from every angle.

This garden will be one of twenty which will comprise the show, in every conceivable design from the large estate garden to one for the man with a small city lot with limited means.

A gigantic bird house exhibit, in which thousands of birdhouses and feeding stations made by the school children of Detroit will be shown. In connection with this there will be an extensive exhibit by the Michigan Conservation Department, and a scientific exhibit from the Cranbrook Institute of Science.

The Detroit Audubon Club will conduct a bird-guessing contest in one of the major gardens of the show. Birds will be perched on the trees and among the shrubs and on the ground according to their natural habits. The bird lover guessing the greatest number correctly will be given a copy of Audubon's The Birds of America.

Second and third prizes will also be bird books, donated by the Michigan Horticultural Society.

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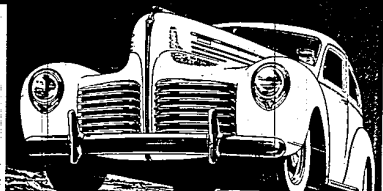
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
