Call 5,000 For Rouge Cleanup

Armies of youths and adults are needed for a massive attack on the middle section of the Rouge River which will be launched between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 25. The "Rescue the Rouge" day is being coordinat-

ed by Jaycee chapters in western Wayne County to remove the debris that blocks the flow of water in the

The most important element in the cleanup is manpower, and the Jaycees are hoping to get 5,000 ecology-minded people in boots, gloves and old clothing to work in the river.

The project is similar to a recent cleanup in Detroit except that the bands of people will be working in the middle section of the Rouge which extends through Observerland, from Northville to Ford Road.

REMOVING DEBRIS speeds the flow of the river, eliminating stagnant pools where mosquitoes breed and increasing flood control.

"We want every man, woman and child who is concerned about the pollution of the Rouge River to assist us in cleaning the debris from the river on this one day," project chairman Dave Crowell said.

"We have had good cooperation from the county and city governments in equipment and manpower," he said. "Now we need the people of our communities to turn out and help."

Equipment has been donated by the county, cities and invited requires to brack up the largue legities and invited requires to brack up the largue legities.

Equipment has been donated by the county, cities and private sources to break up the large log jams and haul the debris away.

"Anyone who can bring a chain saw or ropes is encouraged to do so. These are the things we need to clear away these log jams," Crowell said, urging persons to come in clothing suitable to work in the river.

Lunch will be provided for the persons working on the river.

IN COORDINATING the manpower needed for the day, the Jaycees are contacting high schools and junior high schools from each community to enlist student help.

state Jaycee vice president. "We encourage all
students to take this opportunity to do something
about the pollution problem."

day, Sept. 16, in the auditorium of the City-County Building, Detroit.


The hearing will be conducted jointly by a special stadium committee of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners and the five-member Wayne County Stadium Authority.

The stadium, expected to cost \$100.9150 million, is proposed to be built at no cost to the taxpayers through issuance of revenue bonds. The bonds would be paid for through rents collected from the sports


