# Lawrence Tech Wins North Central Credits

Lawrence Institute of Technology has received an excellent report from the North Central Association as the college begins its 40th anniversary year this fall. The NCA announced a continuation of L.I.T. accreditation following a periodic visit by its examination committee.

Excerpts from the report said, "The institution has identified a mission and is achieving it well..."

"Three separate, distinct student bodies share the excellent, well-located physical facilities... this results in an exceptionally efficient utilization of plant resources."

"The financial stability of the institution is excellent..."

"The maturity and concern of the student body is a major strength..."

LIT has been located in Southfield at Northwestern Freeway and 10 Mile Road since 1955, when it moved there from Highland Park.

DR. WAYNE H. BUELL, who is beginning his eighth year as L.I.T. president, said: "We are pleased and encouraged by the fine report. The examining committee cited many strengths and also made valuable suggestions for improvement."

The NCA declares that, in its evaluation of institutions of higher education, it is guided by a set of seven basic questions:

What is the educational task of the institution?

Are the necessary resources available for carrying out the task of the institution?

Is the institution well-organized for carrying out its educational task?

Are the programs of instruction adequate in kind and quality to serve the purposes of the institution?

Are the institution's policies and practices such as to foster high faculty morale?

Is student life on campus relevant to the institution's educational task?

Is student achievement consistent with the purposes of the institution?

In accordance with NCA practice to regularly schedule

review visits to member institutions, a NCA team re-examined L.I.T. in April of this year for the first time since the college was accredited in April, 1967.

They fanned throughout the campus dropping unannounced into many classrooms and laboratories in session. They saw day and evening college and technical institute classes in action. They were supplied with additional institutional data covering all aspects of the college operation.

President Buell commented on the progress of the college. "This college started with a great faith and about 300 students, in rented quarters, in 1932 during the early years of the Great Depression," he said.

"Today, as the college starts its 40th year with an enrollment of approximately 4000 men and women, it is the second largest private college in Michigan."

"The college now owns its 85 acre campus and buildings and has no debt except for the government loan for partial financing of its Science Building. A science building fund was established to service this debt and contributions to this fund total \$264,885."

"Although the college operates in the black, we are in great need of funds for capital improvements. The most urgently needed building is a student activities center."

"We have excellent academic facilities and a fine group of hard working students but do not have quarters and spaces for them to convene for various student activities, social events, and recreation."

"So far we have built a good home but without a living room. Now we need a living room -- a student activities building."

A fund drive for the student activities building is in progress.



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## Adult Science Courses Offered

It's back-to-school time again for children and even for adults at Cranbrook Institute of Science.

Beginning Sept. 21, the institute at 500 Lone Pine Road, will offer four adult education courses.

"BASIC ASTRONOMY" will provide a background on the solar system and the universe with sessions in the Institute planetarium and observatory (weather permitting), using the six-inch refracting telescope, star charts and celestial spheres. William Schultz Jr. is instructor of the class meeting 8 to 10 p.m. Tuesdays, Sept. 21 to Nov. 9. Fee is \$30.

"Fall Wildflowers" is a laboratory plant study course with field trips to local wildflower areas. Enrollment is limited in the course meeting 8 to 10 p.m. Thursdays, September 23 to October 14. Dr. James R. Wells is instructor. Fee is \$10.

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"Lapidary Techniques" will include practical instruction in the sawing, grinding and polishing of semi-precious stones. Enrollment is limited in the course meeting 7 to 10 p.m. Thursdays, Sept. 23 to Nov. 11. Brian Lickley is instructor. Fee is \$30.

"Introduction to Anthropology" is the study of man for those interested in gaining deeper insights into human behavior. Small group discussions of man's biological evolution and patterns of cultural change will take place in addition to viewing films and Institute exhibits and collections. The class taught by Robert Bowen meets 8 to 10 p.m. Thursdays, Sept. 30 to Dec. 9. Fee is \$40.

Participants may register by phone, but fees must be paid one week in advance of first class.
