AT THE REDFORD THEATER



The boisterous town of the good old days, when cows roamed Fifth Avenue and a barmaid—or a lady—could win a man like Robert Fulton, are brought vividly to life on the screen in Darryl F. Zanuck's production of "Little Old New York" (the 20th Century-Fox film, which comes to the Redford Theater on Friday, with Alice Faye, Fred MacMurray, Richard Greene and Brenda Joyce heading a splendid cast. This robust, romantic drama casts Alice Faye in the most colorful role as the fiery belle for the waterfront who fell headlong for handsome Robert Fulton—and went after him, while the brawling "waterfront" cheered her on. MacMurray is seen as the sturdy shipbuilder engaged to build the Clermont, after Fulton's model for the first steamboat; Greene is seen as the dashing inventor himself; and blonde Brenda Joyce has the role of the lovely girl who loved him, helped him to attain his dream in the face of ridicule, and who later became his wife. Others prominently featured in the cast are Andy Devine, Henry Stephenson and Fritz Feld. Directed by Henry King, "Little Old New York" offers the most spectacular production of the producer-director combination. Sponsors of these projects and gave to the screen such unforgettable films as "In Old Chicago," "A Lexa and the Ragtime Band," "Stanley and Livingston" and "Jesse James." Before the actual filming of "Little Old New York" began, Director King, his assistant, Bob Webb, and a camera crew spent a few weeks in the East photographing old New York backgrounds and scenes along the Hudson for the production. They also did a vast amount of research on the history of the town and the career of Robert Fulton.

Sponsors of these projects and the WPA supervisors in charge will welcome visitors to their projects during the week of May 2 to 25 and will provide demonstrations of the work being accomplished. Luncheon clubs, civic groups, Chambers of Commerce, and church organizations will be among the special groups invited to take part in the program, Mr. Larned said.

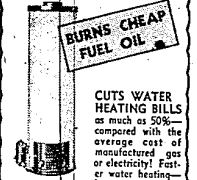
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WPA SPONSORS TO HOLD OPEN HOUSE MAY 20-25
