NEW TELEPHONE REPAIRMAN IS A 30-YEAR VETERAN

Although a relative newcomer to Farmington, Freeman G. Butler, telephone repairman here for the Michigan Bell Telephone Company, is anything but a fledgling in his business. As a matter of fact, he will observe his 30th anniversary with the Bell System this month.

Telephone subscribers here have only to ponder about the inconvenience they would suffer in being without service to gauge the importance of Butler's duties. It is his job to prevent service trouble in every way possible and to restore service as quickly as possible. And the trouble may range from a broken cord on the telephone itself to a severed cable. Let a violent storm hit the community and his repair duties may become multitudinous.

The telephone career of Butler, who was born in Simcoe, Ontario, has extended into two countries, and two states in this country. He began work with the Bell Telephone Company of Canada in 1904, and at one time was with the Southern California Telephone Company, at Los Angeles.

His service with the Michigan Bell Telephone Company began when he started as a line installer at Lansing in 1924. He went to Farmington to complete his term in 1929 and remained there until the first of this year, when he came to Farmington.

Butler is active in lodge circles, being a member of the Masonic Order and the Modern Woodmen of America. He is also a member of the Telephone Pioneers of America, Wolverine Chapter.

'Voice Reflector' Gadget, May Cut Auto Accidents

Wives who go to bridge clubs but want to leave messages for their husbands with the proper emphasis on "don't," take heed. Husbands who think their wives might change their sound tracks if they could only hear themselves as husbands hear them, give ear.

Sidney K. Wolf, New York acoustical engineer, has solved both problems and many others with a device he calls a "voice reflector."

The British and French governments are interested in it because it might help cut down traffic accidents during blackouts and might permit railroad trains to run safely without visible signals.

Railroads believe it will make possible the delivery of telegrams, news reports and stock market tables to crack trains while they are speeding across the country.

The gadget consists fundamentally of a thin strip of steel tape and a device which reads the molecular pattern of the tape as it speaks into a microphone. The tape, without other preparation, may then be run through the voice reflector and reproduces whatever has been spoken into the microphone. The words or sounds may be repeated endlessly, since the tape never wears out or the molecular pattern may be erased and the tape used over and over again.

The allied governments have consulted with Wolf about using a railway to control traffic during blackouts. Attached to traffic posts along a highway, a loop of the tape might broadcast on a specified wave length the words "stop" and "go" at regular intervals. Thus eliminating the need for traffic lights.

By radio control, with the tape broadcasting audio signals, a railway to control traffic during blackouts and green lights which would duplicate the signal lights along its route. The tape, directed from a central control tower, could change the signals in the cab by radio, Wolf said, avoiding the necessity for outside signal lights visible to enemy bombers and giving the position of a strategic railroad.

95-Pound Woman Driver Operates Large Trucks

Driving a 12,000-pound truck is a cinch for Mrs. Katherine Rainville of Providence, R. I., who weighs 95 pounds.

Averaging 50,000 to 75,000 miles a year, Ma-as she is known to truck drivers-carries new automobiles between Buffalo and Providence in all kinds of weather. She loaded the weight of her truck is doubled.

Mrs. Rainville not only drives the truck, but makes whatever repairs are necessary. She also loads and unloads the vehicle after getting the 200-pound runways in position.

Portion of Muskegon Closed to Fishing

Closed to all fishing, including the taking of minnows, is a short section of the Muskegon river, from Houghton Lake outlet dam to the bridge of a quarter of a mile above Meade's while a pike spawning and migration study is in progress.

The conservation department's Institute for fisheries research has installed weirs in this section of the stream to check on northern pike movements in spawning seasons, continuing a study begun a year ago. The weirs will be removed about July 1.

Fishermen are advised that operation of motorboats in the posted spawning area also is temporarily halted.

Limestone Recommended For Fish Improvement

For improvement of fishing in four typical northern Michigan glacial pit lakes Dr. A. S. Hazard of the conservation department's Institute for fisheries research, recommends fertilization with crushed limestone and soybean meal.

The four lakes are Tie, Temple, Man and McComb lakes in Alger county. An institute crew investigated them for the presence or abundance of fish and other animal life, plants, mineral, organic and oxygen content of the water, and other items important to fish life.

Fertilization and artificial brush shelters are recommended by the institute to touch off a chain of improvements. They would increase the growth of water plants and small organisms which provide food and shelter for the game fish directly and for lesser species on which game fish feed.

To overcome the deficiency of these lake waters in basic salts and organic matter would cost an estimated 50 cents an acre for fertilizer each year for three years. The lakes have an area of 16 to 60 acres each. They are sheltered from wind action, and have neither inlet or outlet through which the fertilizer could be lost.

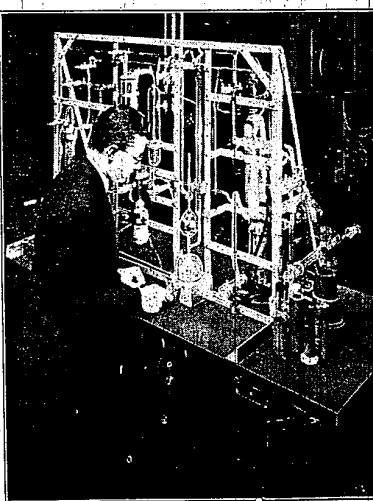

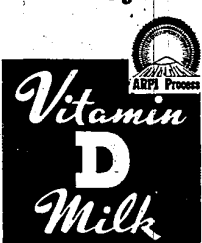


Vitamin D Milk Supplies Essential Material Needed

Industrial Motion Pictures

The motion picture camera, which doesn't miss a movement is being used to show industrial engineering students at the Pennsylvania State college how to speed up the assembly of common industrial products. Using strictly factory methods, the students assemble small fixtures having 12 or more parts while the unfailing camera records their movements and the time. A clock-face in front of the students pictures the passing of time on the film, even to 1/2,000th of a minute. After the films are completed, minute studies are made to find ways of speeding up the process. A simple but unnecessary wrist motion might mean the difference between turning out 40 fixtures an hour or 50 fixtures, and hence is a waste of time and effort.

Planing Wood With a Press

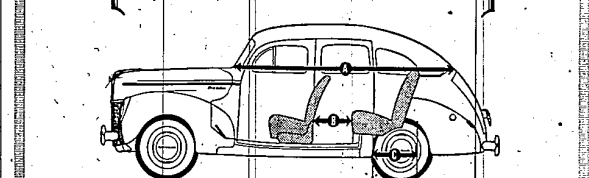
Wood surfaces can be planed to a smooth finish on the drill press with a rotary planer. It is a disc-shaped with three high-speed tool-steel cutting knives and fits into the chuck of any powered woodworking drill press. Any size plank that can be moved on the drill press table can be handled and the tool will plane a plank two feet by eight inches in 25 to 30 seconds. Blades are adjusted with feeler gauges so they extend .002 below the center face of cutter body and it is recommended that the drill press depth gauge be set to take a cut one thirty-second of an inch or lighter, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. A patented set-screw arrangement holds the cutting blades securely, so it is impossible for them to get out of adjustment while in operation.

Aluminum Priming

Aluminum paint, because of its high resistance to water penetration, is an excellent paint to use for exterior priming or, at any other place where a surface needs such protection. If the building budget permits, it is wise to have the backs of all clapboards or other wood wall covering painted before erection. In this manner the life of the outside paint will be prolonged.
