HUDSON RIVER FERRY IS VERY ACCOMMODATING

A ferry service that is available by telephone exists between Sweden Landing and Dobbs Ferry, N. Y., on the banks of the Hudson River. It is believed to be the second oldest ferry service in New York State, and part only to the Staten Island service in New York harbor. The ferry was founded in 1693, and until recent years transportation was by sailing craft, operated much of the time by the Dobbs and Sweden families for whom the communities were named. Though not an aquatic counterpart of the "Tonawanda Trolley," the Sweden Landing Ferry has shown singular concern for its patrons' convenience, and those detained in the city too late to catch the last boat have only to telephone ahead to the skipper, in order to be accommodated by a special trip.
