Farmington Gets Job Funds

FARMINGTON
The City of Farmington has received word it will receive funds to hire two employees under the federal Emergency Employment Act of 1971.

The federal grant will pay 90 per cent, or \$15,770, with the city's share being training, administration and certain fringe benefits.

The two employees being added to the city's work force will be an automobile mechanic and a maintenance man for the Water and Sewer Department.

City Manager John Dinan applied for funding of six employees, after telling councilmen of his intent, but the government pared the request down to two employees it will underwrite for two years.

In other action, the council confirmed the appointment of Mrs. Francis Sarto as coordinator of activities for the city's senior citizens.

Mrs. Sarto is supervising four senior citizen centers throughout the Walled Lake and Novi areas and has already planned two Fall field trips for the Farmington senior citizens. She will be paid \$5 per hour.

The council established a policy of not giving additional credit for off-street parking for special assessment payments within the Downtown Farmington Center municipal parking lot because it is at full capacity at the present time.

Dinan reported that, under the revenue sharing act passed by the State Senate, the city will receive about \$5,000 in new funds this year and could receive \$50,000 in new funds for the next fiscal year.

The Senate version based returns to cities on the total

tax load (including school taxes paid) of the community instead of the House version which did not give credit for school taxes.

Dinan admits, however, that the anticipated \$50,000 return to the city would be appreciably less should the property tax for schools be eliminated or declared unconstitutional.

Speculation from Lansing is that Attorney General Frank Kelley, following the lead of the California Supreme Court, will declare property taxes for schools unconstitutional after Dec. 1.

DINAN ALSO reported the city has received \$25,000 more in building permit fees than had been budgeted as anticipated income. The unexpected \$25,000 more is being divided between the Freedom-Farmington Rd. drain enclosure (\$12,500) with the balance to pay for the city's share of federally funded communication equipment for the police department.

Two proposed ordinances introduced by the council for consideration at its next meeting were: a zoning amendment providing for cluster housing in the city; and an amendment providing for regulations of signs in the Central Business District.

The council also adopted traffic control orders prohibiting parking on the east side of Gill from Grand River to Freedom and on Shawwassee from Farmington Rd. to Grand River.

The council adopted a resolution proclaiming the week of Sept. 26 as Civil Air Patrol Week and the week of Sept. 18 as Monsignor Thomas Beahan Week.

Permission was denied the A&P in the Downtown Farmington Center to locate a dumpster for trash storage behind its store along Orchard St.

A resolution was passed urging the Legislature to subsidize the losses suffered by the DSR for the reduced fares offered senior citizens and students.
