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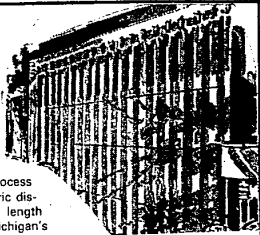
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## Low-Salt Cookery Taught

## Black History, Pop Art Added To YWCA Schedule

Black history and pop art are the latest additions to the expanded class and activity schedule at the Northwest YWCA, 25940 Grand River, Redford Township.

Also in the offing is a workshop on the use of carpet scraps and an expanded program for youth getting under way beginning Sept. 25.

Jim Williams of the Inter-Faith Center for Racial Justice will teach the nine-week course in black history, to meet from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Mondays, beginning Tuesdays beginning Sept. 28.

The class will encompass the history of black Americans from Africa to the present, with its content designed to promote understanding of their contributions to this country's development.

THE POP ART COURSE is one of several designed for high school students. It will involve creating decorative and useful items from such junk as old clocks and bits of metal and wood.

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## Classes Will Begin At YWCA

Tennis and bridge tournaments as well as swimming and after school classes will be held this fall at the YWCA of Metropolitan Detroit, 639 S. Crooks Road in Clawson.

The after school youth activities will begin the week of Sept. 27 with a graded ballet program - ranging from beginner to advanced classes. Turnbuling classes will be held for children over the age of four.

Girls in grades four, five and six can participate in classes in baton twirling, macrame and the Girl Scout art badge workshop.

An art workshop is scheduled for youths over age six and folk guitar for youths over 12.

A 10-week swimming program will begin Sept. 29 and 30 with instruction in beginning, intermediate and advanced instruction for girls over seven years of age. Six-year-olds who can float may also be included.

A "Mom-Tot" water adjustment program is provided for mothers with children over two years of age.

Adult classes are offered on Wednesday at 9:15 and 10 a.m. and on Thursday evenings at 7:45 p.m.

The annual bridge tournament will begin in October. Three groups are available including women's daytime, women's evening and couples evening. The games are played in the homes of the participants and each twosome plays eight monthly games.

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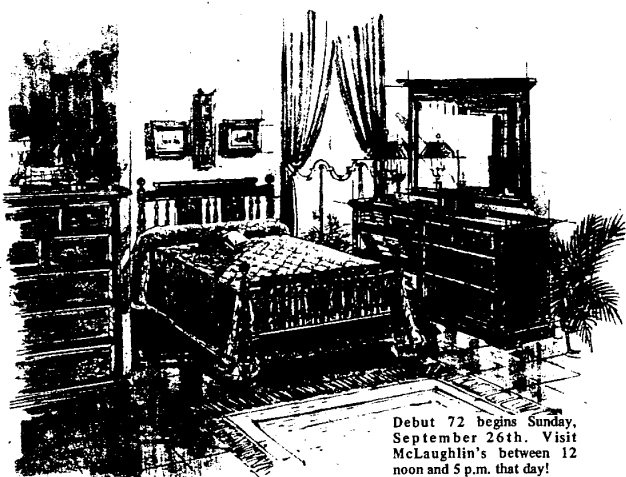
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
