Those who elect a two-year program in a specific area may earn six credits or more. Students attend classes five days a week and are bussed to Walled Lake.

THE VOCATIONAL education program is designed for students enrolled in high schools.

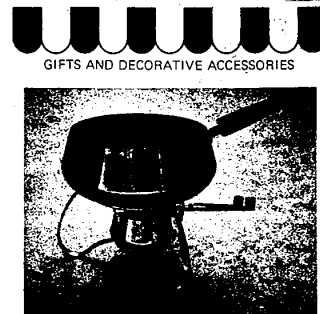
It is available to persons with special needs, for those who have completed high school and need additional education and instruction for employment, for those who have dropped out of school, those who want to increase their knowledge, for those who

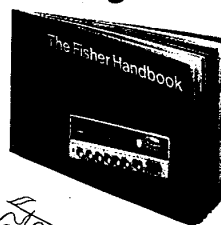

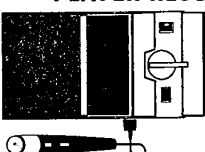

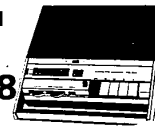
