DISTRICT NO. 9
Annual meeting of the School Board of District No. 9 held at the John Grace School Monday, July 8th, 1940.
Meeting called to order at 8:10 P. M. President Rolland Charpentier in the chair.
Members of the Board present were Rolland Charpentier, president; Ollie Kallman, secretary; Eva Tesch, treasurer; Elmer Hardow, trustee; Otto Esler, trustee, absent.
The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.
The financial report was read, Motion by Mr. Green supported by Mr. Leitch the report be accepted as read. Carried.
Under new business election of trustees was in order, two to be elected the terms of Otto Esler and Rolland Charpentier having expired.
Nominated were: Rolland Charpentier and Jack Konkel.
Motion by Mr. Cote supported by Mrs. Hardow nominations close. Carried.
Mr. Leitch and Mr. Oliver were appointed tellers. Votes cast, 64. Rolland Charpentier, 47; Jack Konkel, 17. Rolland Charpentier, duly elected as trustee for three years.
Nominations were open for a second trustee. Nominated were: Will J. Oliver and Otto Esler.
Motion by Mrs. Tesch supported by Mrs. Hardow nominations close. Carried.
Mr. Oliver being a candidate for election, Mr. Saxton was appointed teller. Votes cast, 62. Mr. Oliver, 45; Mr. Esler, 22; 1 blank. Mr. Oliver duly elected as trustee for three years.
Motion by Mrs. Tesch supported by Mrs. McKenlie the Board of Education pay Farmington High School \$33.60, the amount of tuition asked by the Farmington Board of Education for three pupils attending High School there, from our district. Carried.
Motion by Mr. Cote supported by Mr. Ostrander, the district pay to the receiving High School, the amount per capita Primary Money for pupils attending their school. Carried.
Motion made by Mrs. Charpentier supported by Mr. Leitch, the School Board's salaries remain the same. Carried.
An amendment to the foregoing motion was offered by Mr. Leitch supported by Mrs. McKenlie to raise Treasurer's salary \$25.00.
Motion by Mrs. Tesch supported by Mr. Ellis meeting adjourn. Carried.

OAKLAND COUNTY RED CROSS WOMEN PREPARE SHIPMENT

Women volunteers of the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, are completing the fourth quota of garments, knitted articles and surgical dressings for relief of war refugees in Europe. Shipment will be made September 1. Workrooms which have been in operation during the summer months are the Pontiac workroom where the Canadian Legion Auxiliary, Women's Relief Corps, All Saints Guild No. 2, Daughters of the Union Veterans, Wednesday Community Club, and the Camp Fire Girls have been making garments for the quota. Christ Church workroom has increased its workers and has made great strides in its completion of garments and surgical dressings. Birmingham has also continued its sewing and the Royal Oak workroom has been working on garments and surgical dressings every day during the summer. Despite the hot weather, many women have been giving their time in order that the Oakland County quota may be filled. The entire production program of the chapter functions under the direction of Mrs. Howard Robinson, Chairman of Volunteer Service, and Mrs. F. S. Strong, Jr., Vice Chairman. Mrs. Robinson and Mrs. Strong are assisted by the following committees: County Chairman of Production, Mrs. Sheldon Noble, Birmingham; Chairman of Cutting, Mrs. Harold A. Furlong, Pontiac; Sewing Chairman, Mrs. L. W. Gately, Pontiac; Knitting Chairman, Mrs. Claire Gansler, Pontiac; Uniform Chairman, Mrs. T. W. Jackson; Motor Corps, Mrs. E. C. Kneale, Pontiac; Packing and shipping, Mrs. Lawrence Sheffield, Pontiac; Inspection Mrs. Clarence Patterson and Mrs. Harlan Smith, Pontiac. The various workrooms and knitting centers are in charge of the following: Pontiac, Mrs. L. W. Gately; surgical dressings, Mrs. Frank Foster and Mrs. C. G. Burke; Christ Church, Mrs. Sheldon Noble and Mrs. W. B. Rose-year, surgical dressings; lower Oakland County, Mrs. W. G. Langdon and Mrs. F. W. Telford. Garments are cut and materials are prepared for distribution in the central workroom at 10 Seneca Street, Pontiac. Completed garments are returned by the various workrooms and inspected before they are shipped. Dr. Harold A. Furlong, Chairman

of the Chapter, states that recent information received from Norman H. Davis, National Chairman, states that Red Cross supplies are now being distributed in unoccupied portions of Europe. Mr. Davis gives his assurance to the American public that neither food nor supplies have been seized by any nation, neither have they been diverted from the needy for whom they were intended. The needs for relief are daily increasing in the areas in which the Red Cross is now operating.

ST. JOHNS IS MINT CAPITAL OF ENTIRE WORLD

If while travelling around our great state of Michigan during the summer months, a person detects a sweet, refreshing odor coming from the surrounding countryside which strongly resembles that of the gum he is chewing, he may be quite certain that he is in the immediate vicinity of St. Johns in Clinton County, for that Michigan city is the mint capital of the entire world.

Right now one will find smoke pouring from tall smokestacks of stills on practically every farm in the county, for the mint harvest is starting and farmers are distilling the leaves to obtain the precious oil, a heavy colorless liquid, from which every product with the scent or taste of mint receives its flavor.

Michigan stands first in the United States in the production of mint. There are several counties in the state, however, that produce this crop in commercial quantities; among these are Shiawassee, Gratiot, Sanilac, Eaton, Allegan, Van Buren, Berrien, Cass, St. Joseph and Branch along with Clinton.

In 1939 there were 15,000 acres of mint harvested and this year will find a slight increase in acreage. Farmers will receive a contract price somewhat higher than a year ago, and the crop will be depending on the weather, almost average in yield.

Commenting on the mint crop, Agricultural Commissioner Elmer A. Deemer, states that "The place which Michigan holds in the production of mint again shows the wide diversification of agriculture in our state, and the ability of our farmers to take advantage of every opportunity to increase their income by solving crops especially suited to the soil."
