Dr. Cobb Announces Candidacy for Coroner

Dr. Leon F. Cobb for 17 years a practicing physician in Pontiac, this week made formal announcement of his candidacy on the Republican ticket for the office of Coroner. He has been a taxpayer in Oakland County for 29 years and has never sought or held public office.

Pontiac Township, receiving his elementary education in rural schools, and graduating from Lakes Ontario high school in 1916. He attended Wayne University, received his degree of Doctor of Medicine in 1921, and spent his hospital service in Grace, Booth Memorial and Detroit City Receiving Hospitals. He enlisted in the Medical Reserve during the World War.

Dr. Cobb began practice of medicine in Pontiac in 1923 and is now a member and President-elect of the Oakland County Medical Society.

Users, Not Township To Pay for Water

A statement which read, "Total cost is estimated now at \$144,250, toward which the Federal government will contribute \$8 per man month, leaving approximately \$72,000 for the Township to finance."

As presented in last week's story of the Township Board meeting, concerning the plan to provide Detroit City water for residents of the southeastern portion of the Township.

No such meaning was intended or should be drawn from the statement. The obligation which the bonds entail falls upon the actual users of the water, not upon the township.

Those residents of the district which is to receive the service, namely those living within the territory bounded on the east by Inkster Road, on the south by Eight Mile Road, on the west by Middlebelt Road and on the north by Shiloh avenue, will assume the responsibility of paying off the bonds, which will be accomplished by an addition to the regular payments for water.

It is hoped that the provisions of the new law are too elaborate, and he pledges himself, if elected, to co-operate fully with the authorities in setting up a system more suited to our needs.
