OAKLAND COUNTY GIVEN \$5,066,328 IN STATE FUNDS

Oakland County ranked third in the amount of State and federal funds received during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1940, according to a financial report issued by Auditor General Vernon J. Brown. The County received \$5,066,328.73. The state contributed a total of \$109,874,482.25 to counties during the last fiscal year compared with \$123,108,773.32 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1939. The comparison, however, is not an exact one because during the interval there was a change in the accounting system. Certain expenditures for 1938 were included in the amount for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1939 which were not included in the last fiscal year.

Oakland County's State assistance during the past fiscal year was divided as follows: General governmental purposes, \$2,286,255.67; education, \$2,476,807.38; health, \$169,539.57; public welfare, \$1,065,738.17; and highways, \$1,352,817.25.
