

NEW TYPE TO MAKE PHONE BOOKS EASIER TO READ

Adoption of a new kind of type for directories of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company that will make listings easier to read than now, has been announced by John J. MacLachlan, district manager for the company.

The new type, known as "Bell Gothic," is to be used in virtually

all forthcoming directories of the company throughout its territory, including the one at the Farmington exchange. Bell Gothic differs chiefly from the present type face used in directories by having thinner characters, allowing more space about the characters and thus making for greater legibility. The next issue of the Farmington telephone directory will be published soon.

Calcium and Dolomite Reserves Located
Abundant reserves of high calcium content limestone and dolomite, never before mapped, are indicated by findings of a survey party working this summer for the conservation department's geological survey in Chippewa, Mackinac, and Schoolcraft counties. Next summer the two belts of rock are to be traced through Dolomite county.

The geologists mapped the outcrops of the two kinds of rock from Drummond Island westward, and took samples for laboratory analysis.

High calcium content limestone is used in smelting iron ore. Dolomite is a potential source of magnesium, a light metal used in alloys for airplane parts.

Fire Fighting Methods Attract Attention
An discussion of new methods of fighting forest fires which described the well-drilling outfit that has been developed at the conservation department's forest fire experiment station at Roscommon, is attracting wide attention. First inquiry concerning the well-drilling outfit which quickly taps ground water, and referring to the published article, was received from Daytona Beach, Fla., within a week of publication.

Inquiries concerning fire fighting equipment developed at the station have been received from such far-away points as Russia and Australia.
