

# This Is How the Country's Draft Plan Will Operate

There will be nothing very complicated about registering for the draft. No registration form that even the most likely candidate for a year in the army will receive an immediate call. Collectively he may never receive one.

On October 16, which falls on Wednesday, all men 21 to 35 years old, inclusive, will appear in person to register at places established in their own neighborhoods. So far as possible, it is planned that they shall register at their regular voting booths and that the inspectors who officiate at the registration process.

It has been estimated that approximately 1,200,000 Michigan men will be compelled to register. Cards to be shuffled and numbered. What the range of numbers will be has not been indicated. Next, in Washington, numbers will be drawn by lot.

Each man whose registration card carries a number corresponding with one in the series to be drawn, will then be set down to be among the first called from his local group. These men will receive

will be called in the order that their numbers were drawn in the draft lottery, and subjected to a physical examination. Those unable to pass it will be rejected and the next man to qualify will be taken.

Men in deferred classifications will not be called unless there are not enough draftees in Class One to meet the army's needs.

Registering, as has been said, will be simple. The intricate part of the process comes when the prospect receives his questionnaire. The present form—probably subject to minor changes to conform with the law as finally drawn—runs eight pages and makes an income tax blank look childish.

What the Questions Are

Its questions are divided into 13 categories that follow:

1—PHYSICAL. It asks if the registrant has physical defects and if he is a hospital or asylum patient.

2—DEPENDENCY. Complete details are sought on any support contributed to another person by the registrant. There is a whole page of questions and dependents who are past 16 have to fill out an appended affidavit.

3—INFORMATION FOR MILITARY AUTHORITIES. Here personal history is sought, along with details as to education, occupation, special aptitudes, and even hobbies.

4—RELIGIOUS CONVICTIONS AGAINST WAR. The government wants to know, among other things, of what well-recognized sect the registrant is a member, when the sect includes an antiwar dogma in its creed, and the address of the particular church or religious assembly.

5—FEDERAL, STATE, TERRITORIAL, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL EMPLOYEES. Such regis-

trants are asked details of their work, and if it is adjudged vital to defense they may be deferred.

7—MARINE PILOTS. Pilots also will be deferred, but have to give the facts about their pursuit of the profession.

8—MINISTER OF RELIGION. Questions are provided for clergymen seeking deferred classification.

9—AGRICULTURAL OCCUPATION. This takes a full page and goes into extreme detail, including asking why a relative or somebody else can't work the farm while you are in the army.

10—OTHER OCCUPATIONS. This takes the greater part of a page and is for those seeking exemption because of the nature of occupation. An affidavit is attached.

11—CITIZENSHIP. Complete details of the registrant's citizenship are asked, including facts about his parents, and whether they were naturalized. Special space is provided for Indians, and among other things the government wants to know if the registrant lives with, or apart, from his tribe.

12—COURT RECORDS. All facts concerning a criminal career, if any, are required; and if the registrant happens to be in jail at the time of filling out the questionnaire, the reason is wanted.

13—CLAIM OF WAIVER. If the registrant seeks a special classification, he must explain his grounds.

Appeals Made Possible

If the local board disallows a plea for a deferred classification, the registrant may take his case to an appeal board. If he loses there, he may carry it to the President.

One thing is very important. The registrant must carry his registration card with him at all times. If he is found to be without one, the immediate assumption will be that he is a draft evader. This can lead to detention until the registrant can prove that he has left his card at home.

The Army-Navy Selective Service Board, which will operate the draft, estimates that about one-third of the 15,000,000 men between 21 and 35 are physically fit, without dependents, and not employed in an essential industry.

It figures that there will be a minimum of 5,000,000 available from which to choose the first 400,000 to be trained for the army.
