## Humbles Will Talk On India

The Humbles and their four children spent three years as missionaries in India. Mr. Humble was principal of a school for the children of missionaries from 14 different denominations and Mrs. Humble was a librarian. Both helped start self-help

programs and worked with Skippo, an organization which sent a medical van to help villagers who were unable to get to hospitals and which started a school to teach children who were street beggars to read and write and help themselves.

Skippo also distributed and collected sweaters from the United States to distribute to the needy. Sponsored by the American Lutheran Church Women, their speech is open to the public.

MONEY FROM the benefit will go to Hadassah Hospital's basic research in cancer. A blood test for diagnosing cancer "far" earlier than present diagnostic methods has been developed there and a United States pharmaceutical firm has bought the rights to manufacture it here.

"Because American medical research grants have been deeply cut back because

of lack of funds, \$1 million is desperately needed to keep this work on-going," Mrs. Albert Newman, Detroit Hadassah president, says.

Every adult attending the performance will receive a bottle of a new brand of wine, Black Jack, gift of Charles Nisan who says it is to take home to make the toast "Le Chiam" which means "to life," one of the main musical themes in the story.

All seats are reserved and tickets are on sale at Hadassah House. General admission for the benefit is \$9 per person. Life Circle preferred seating will be \$10 per ticket and the first eight rows are \$4.50.

## 250 Youths Enjoy CYO Uplift Center

More than 250 boys and girls, ages five through 15, participated in the summer program at the CYO-Uplift Center, 5320 Chene, Detroit.

That is good, but what is even better is the fact that the program, which attracted only black youths in 1970, this year achieved an almost even balance of blacks and whites.

Mrs. Maria Anderson, in her first year as director of the center planned it that way. "We wanted to be relevant to the community, which is made up chiefly of Polish and black families," she says. "We made it clear that all young people were welcome. Problems? We didn't have any real problems. The children got along very well together, at least as well as children ever do."

The summer program at Uplift included sports, a social club, sewing, cooking and upholstery classes, arts and

crafts, dramatics and modern dancing. The center was open from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Fridays, with special activities at other hours.

Robert Perry is the assistant director of the center. Mrs. Ada Johnson, who maintains liaison with parents, and Bill Wise, who runs the sports activities, are part-time workers. The staff is paid by the Detroit CYO.

Four college students, two from Michigan State and two from Ferris State, worked at the center to fulfill the field work requirements for their degrees as part of the baccalaureate training program of the CYO social services division.

Eight high school students assisted. They were paid \$1.60 an hour for approximately 25 hours of work by the Detroit Board of Education's In-School Neighborhood Youth Corps.

## Livonia Lutherans Join In New Religion Classes

Urging prospective students to "dust off your Bibles," the Livonia Lutheran School of Religion is launching its first six-week series of youth and adult education courses Wednesday, Oct. 6.

The school includes a variety of morning, afternoon and evening classes on assorted religion-related topics.

They will be held in three Lutheran churches in Livonia-Ascension, 55301 Five Mile Road; Christ the King, 800 Farmington Road, and Faith Lutheran, 30000 Five Mile.

THOSE THREE CHURCHES together with Holy Cross, Timothy, Sword of the Spirit, Holy Trinity and All Saints, are sponsoring the school of religion.

Courses will be offered from

9:30 to 11 a.m. in Ascension, from 1 to 2:30 p.m. in Christ the King and from 7:45 to 9:30 p.m. in Faith.

The fall series, continuing through Nov. 10, is the first of three to be offered by the school of religion. Winter and spring terms will include some of the favorite ones from this session and some new ones.

The cost is \$2.50 per person one course with a maximum of \$5 per family. Babysitting is provided for the daytime sessions.

"PARABLES OF CONFLICT" is the title of the morning course. A study of the parables of Luke relating to current issues, it will be taught by the Rev. Roger Schiele, pastor of Faith Lutheran. The Rev. William Wolfe,

pastor of Sword of the Spirit, will teach the afternoon class that will take up the question "What Was John Trying To Tell Us?"

FOUR CLASSES are offered in the evening sessions.

Jerry Knight, a Lutheran layman, will lead "Journey to Freedom," described as a religious "fun" course for teens, and the Rev. John Root, pastor of Christ the King, will conduct a study of the book of Ephesians, considering it as "a letter written by Paul to the Christians in Livonia."

"Christians in Families" will be taught by the Rev. Fred Balke, pastor of Holy Trinity, and Arnold Witt, director of the new Christian education program at Faith, will teach a course on "Creative Teaching."

## Church Breaks Ground For Move To Westland

Moving its base of operations from Wayne to Westland, the 32-year-old First of Peace Lutheran Church breaks ground at 10 a.m. Sunday, Sept. 26, for a building on Palmer Road west of Newburgh.

The occasion also marks the 22nd anniversary of the official formation of the congregation, which now worships in a church on Fourth between Michigan and Sims in Wayne.

Bishop Robert L. Wielmann of the Michigan District of the American Lutheran Church will preside for the ground-breaking, and Mayor Eugene McKinley of Westland will be on hand to welcome the congregation to his community.

The congregation will gather first at the Stevenson School, 38475 Palmer, for a service of Holy Communion honoring 83 charter members. There will be a procession to the new site. A

representative of the charter members and a representative of the church school will turn the first shovel of earth.

Prince of Peace Lutheran Church was started in the fall of 1947 when the board of American Missions of the American Lutheran Church held services in the old Wayne High School.

The congregation was organized formally Sept. 26, 1949, and the Rev. Lester F. Heins was called as its first pastor.

Starting with less than 100 members, the congregation now numbers nearly 500 confirmed and 800 baptized members. The Rev. James D. Beckham is pastor.

The decision to move from the downtown Wayne site occupied since 1950 came because of the crowding of the church school and limited parking.

## Altar Society Gives \$700
