DR. S. M. LEWIS HAS BEEN ACTIVE IN COUNTY

Dr. S. M. Lewis, candidate for Coroner in Oakland County, was born in Bay City, Michigan, and is now forty-eight years old. He spent his youth in Midland where he attended High School. From there he went to the University of Michigan and from there to the Detroit College of Medicine and Surgery from which he was graduated in 1918, with the degree of Doctor of Medicine. He then entered the service of the United States Navy as a Lieutenant in the Medical Corps and upon his return from the service he received an internship in Brooklyn, New York, and upon completion of this service came to Farmdale where he has remained ever since.

Dr. Lewis has been active in civic and social affairs of Farmdale and is a life honorary member of the Metropolitan Club, a member of the Police and Fireman's Pension Fund of Farmdale, representing the men of these organizations. He has been Lieutenant Governor and President of the Kiwanis Club, Co-chairman of the Oakland County Community Fund, is a Veteran of Foreign Wars, and the American Legion, and many other civic and social organizations.

Dr. Lewis is also an accomplished bassoon player and is first bassoonist in the Pontiac Philharmonic Orchestra, the Oakland County Philharmonic Orchestra, the Scandinavian Symphony and the Y.M.C.A. Orchestras. Besides this, as a hobby, Dr. Lewis is also interested in fishing and has a business machine shop to occupy his spare time. He is married, a home owner in Farmdale and has two children.
